

Plane to Crash; Ship to Sink at The Dalles AUGUST 14, 1935

The Dalles American Legion Post and "40 or 8" Voiture have gone to the trouble of building an airplane with a 24-foot wingspread, just to let it make one flight and then crash on the field in front of 4,000 spectators.

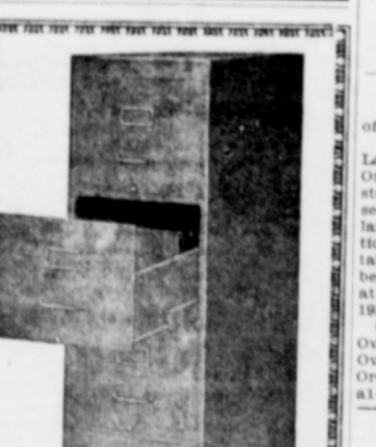
