**25 MEN FOR BOHEMIA DISTRICT NEXT WEEK**

Twenty-five men from Cottage Grove and Eugene, selected from the relief rolls, are expected to go to work next week in the Bohemia district under District Ranger Lynch. They were selected by the reemployment agency at Eugene.

The amount of money allotted for wages is \$6,033. The men will be employed constructing a water system at the Music guard station and reconstructing camps and telephone lines. In addition to this work, the men will handle all fire suppression work in the district.

**LANE COUNTY FINANCES BEST IN FIVE YEARS**

Lane county is in better financial condition than at any time for the past five years, County Treasurer Grace Schiska declared on completion of her semi-annual report.

All road warrants are now being cashed at once and general fund warrants are paid up to July 1, she said. At the time of her last report, January 1, the county was between five and six months behind in payments of warrants.

The county had a little less cash on hand at the close of books June 30, than January 1, but bills in nearly every fund were more completely paid.

The sinking fund is in the red \$7,454.91 in the new report, but sufficient funds are held in accounts of the school districts to cover this overdraft. On January 1 the same fund was overdrawn \$17,819.82.

**SCHOOL BONDS REDUCED TO \$27,500**

Bonded indebtedness of the Cottage Grove school district has been reduced to \$27,500. At the present rate of payment, \$4,000 a year, the district will be clear of bonded debt in seven years.

On June 30 there was a cash balance of \$207.33.

Warrants outstanding June 30 were \$9,066.22.

The percentage of taxes collected so far this year is 49 per cent. With taxes all collected there would be no outstanding warrants. Warrants are cashable.

**FEDERAL ENGINEERS SEE PROPOSED WORK**

Three federal engineers were here Monday to inspect flood control work through the city asked by the chamber of commerce.

Another crew will be here during the coming week to go over the Coast fork south from here to inspect sites for storage dams asked by the chamber of commerce as part of flood control work.

Either the city or county will have to agree to maintain work through the city.

**BIRTHS TWICE NUMBER DEATHS.**

There were twice as many births as deaths here during July, according to the report of Dr. A. W. Kime, city health officer. Births were 10 and were equally divided between the sexes. Deaths were 5, 4 females and 1 male.

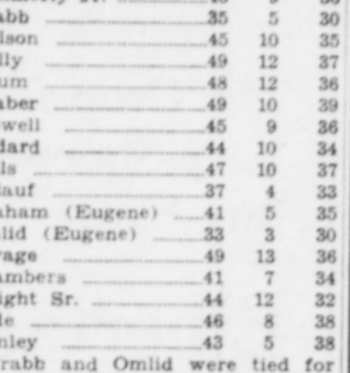
