The old boarding house has been extensively repaired and an addition built. It will be almost a modern hotel and will have accommodations for 32 men. Fifty men are being fed there now, but this crew will be reduced when construction is completed. Mr. and Mrs. John Sanders are in charge of the boarding house. All old buildings are to be repaired.

Five hundred cords of wood are being stacked up for use at the mill this winter and a huge quantity will be supplied for the boarding house. A large part of this will be slabwood from the sawmill that is furnishing lumber for construction.

Already 200,000 feet of lumber and timbers has been cut and the same amount is yet to be cut.

S. L. Godard is in charge of construction and of the sawmill.

Two trucks, one owned by the company, and one owned by Mr. Godard, are kept busy 8 to 10 hours daily hauling lumber and wood and making trips to Cottage Grove.

It is expected that the ball mill will be in operation within 30 days.

Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Bede and daughter Elise and Ray Trask visited the Champion work Monday evening upon the invitation of Mr. Godard and Mr. Stowell, but the party did not have time to visit other properties.

Mining and installation of machinery are going forward at the Helena and a ball mill has been installed there. Several cars of rich ore have been shipped from there.

At the Noonday a considerable quantity of concentrates which accumulated during the winter have been shipped to smelter and it is understood that extensive operations are expected to continue through the winter.

Reports are prevalent that sale of the Musick is imminent, which would mean a big operation there.

How road conditions in the mining district have changed in recent years was indicated by the amount of traffic on the Brice creek road. The party from here had to wait at turnouts several times for other traffic both coming and going. Also the return trip was made after dark. Only a few years ago no one but a reckless driver would attempt to leave Champion after dark.

The party brought out a huge bouquet of the far-famed Bohemia lily.

ployer is compelled to furnish a full working week of 40 hours. It means that the employer agrees to not work men for more than 40 hours in any one week, unless he is willing to pay time and half for overtime beyond the maximum 40-hour week. The reason for this demand is that it will have a tendency to furnish employment to a greater number of men, since employers are likely to put on more men rather than pay for overtime.

"A much disputed point which is not clear to the average person is the demand for union recognition. Recognition of the union does not mean a closed shop. It means that the employer agrees to bargain collectively with the union so long as it represents the majority of employees. Union recognition would not exclude non-union men from obtaining employment."

"Latest word from Portland is that Mr. Marsh, federal mediator, will be sent here sometime during the week. Mr. Marsh is said to have been largely responsible for settlement of the strike at Tacoma, where employers signed an agreement with the union effecting a complete settlement of all difficulties involved.

"So elated were both employers and employees of the Tacoma area with settlement of their difficulties that a big picnic was staged at Pt. Defiance park, in which both employers and employees participated."

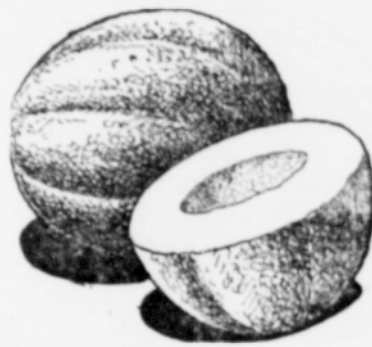
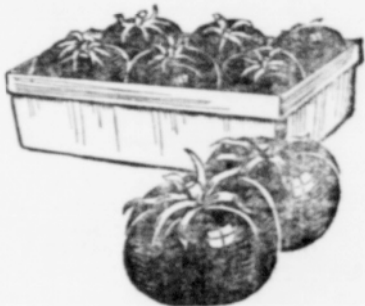
