

THREE MOTOR DEATHS IN LANE IN JULY

Of the 26 automobile accident fatalities in Oregon during July, which brought the 1935 total up to 140, only three were in Lane county, according to the Oregon State Motor association, leader in state safety work.

At the end of July, traffic records for the state revealed a decrease of 18 per cent. fatalities during the same period a year ago having numbered 171. A decrease also was shown in accidents, but the number of injuries was slightly higher.

In Lane county, during July, accidents decreased from 77 to 54, and injuries decreased from 21 to 10. One death was reported in July a year ago.

County Agent Fletcher said the best way to kill the weed is to hoe it out and put salt on the ground. The court made no decision.

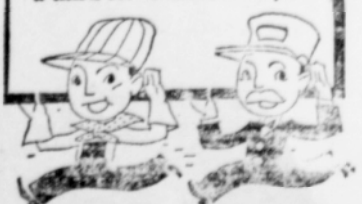

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Romance and History Blend in Famed Greenfield Village



Ford Exposition Visitors See
Miniature Reproductions
of Old Structures

History and romance blend with old buildings and a colonial setting at Greenfield Village, Michigan. The historical buildings, which have been moved or reconstructed as exact duplicates of the originals, circle a "green" as they did in all colonial communities. A model of this interesting group of old buildings forms a part of the Ford Exposition at Balboa Park, San Diego.

Around the green are scattered the public buildings, the church, the school, the inn, the store, the courthouse and the town hall. Each structure has an historic background which is woven into the events which made history in colonial days and into the lives of the country's leading citizens.

One of the oldest buildings in Greenfield Village is Clinton Inn, which was built in 1831-32. It was a typical hostelry of 100 years ago and stood in Clinton, Mich., where it was an overnight stop on the stagecoach run between Detroit and Chicago up to the early fifties. One of the last dances held on the spring ballroom floor was on New Year's in 1876. The inn has been furnished in the style of the early days.

In the steeple of the Chapel of Martha Mary is a bell which was cast by a son of Paul Revere. The church overlooks the green and is open to worshippers of all creeds and serves the residents of the village and pupils of the school as a retreat and religious center. The chapel was named for the mothers of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ford. The bricks and front doors of the first sod was turned by Mr. Ford when its erection was completed.



Directly above is the Chapel of Martha Mary which stands today in Henry Ford's Greenfield Village, at Dearborn, Michigan. A miniature duplication is included in the model of Greenfield Village in the Ford Exposition building, Balboa Park, San Diego. The church is typical of colonial places of worship and is named after the mothers of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ford. The photo at the upper left is of the Waterford, Michigan, store and Clinton, Michigan, Inn as they appear today in Greenfield Village where they have been removed from their original locations. Clinton Inn is about 100 years old and served as an overnight stop on the stagecoach run between Detroit and Chicago. Miniatures are included in the model at the Ford Exposition. The photograph at the top right is that of the Lincoln courthouse where Abraham Lincoln practiced law for eight years in Logansport, Indiana. The structure is made of black walnut and the original was moved to Greenfield Village. It, too, is reproduced in the model at the Exposition.

The town hall is located on the east end of the common, directly opposite the chapel. It is an impressive white building which now serves as the town hall, although during the past year it has been used as a school. The interior includes a rostrum stage at the west end and an old-style stove in front with stovepipes crossing the stage.

Abraham Lincoln practiced law for eight years in the Lincoln County Courthouse which was formerly in Logansport, Indiana, but which now stands in Greenfield Village. It was first built in 1840 as a two-story frame structure of black walnut. One of the articles of furniture in it is the original corner cupboard fashioned by young "Abe" Lincoln and his father to pay for a book borrowed from a neighbor and sold.

Greenfield Village at Dearborn, Michigan, covers 200 acres and includes many buildings in which the handcraft arts of the past are presented as they were practiced in their original environment of public buildings and residences which, in their turn, illustrate the development of architectural types.

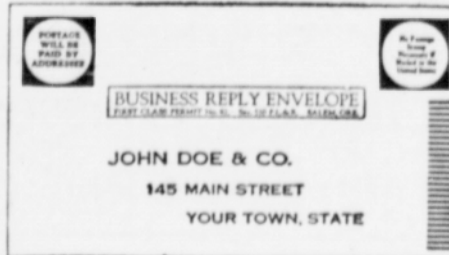
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
