Lumber Outlook Is Hazy One

If Seamen Should Pull
Strike, Deliveries by Water
Would Stop at Once.

The general outlook for the
northwest lumber market is very
hazy.

There is widespread complaint at
the tapering off in new business
both among wholesalers and saw-
mills. That is true of all species of
lumber and shingles. Fortunately
most of the larger operations, es-
pecially the cargo mills, still have
good order files which will carry
them along very comfortably for
another two or three weeks but
they are already beginning to get
uneasy and this adverse relation of
the supply to the current demand
is having an expression in prices.

No one can predict with any de-
gree of certainty just what the fu-
ture holds as there are a number
of unknown quantities that could
become important factors on very
short notice. The most important
of these is the uncertainty existing
as to trouble with longshoremen
and marine workers. In San Fran-
cisco, which is the hotbed and cen-
tral point for all the trouble, spor-
adic strikes of both longshoremen
and seamen are almost a daily oc-
currence and negotiations between
ship owners and the marine work-
ers' unions are still under way
with no prospects of an early
settlement. Shippers and steam-
ship companies have become thor-
oughly disgusted trying to deal
with a lot of irresponsible radicals
whose written agreement is no bet-
ter than their unpendable word
and the process of eliminating
longshoremen from their working
lists who refuse to work on any
legitimate job is already under
way. The longshoremen, in fact all
unions on the Pacific coast, have
during the past year developed a
very sensitive reluctance to pass
through any picket line regardless
of whether it is being established
by one man or a dozen. For that
reason, if the seamen should pull
a strike, which is not improbable,
that longshoremen would refuse to
work is a foregone conclusion and
this would cause a tieup of all wa-
ter movement of lumber to domes-
tic markets.

In the event there is no labor
trouble and the market is shaped
by the normal forces of supply and
demand, another two weeks should
be sufficient to show whether or
not the fall consumption of lumber
will be enough to absorb the pres-
ent production. Standard yard
items appear to be in a healthy
position because none of the mills
equipped to ship mixed cars has
had any opportunity to build stocks
up and there is a genuine shortage
of clears for domestic as well as
export markets in both finished
patterns and special sawn uppers.

The complaint at the inability to
secure good cutting orders is as
great as ever but the mills are
gradually becoming reconciled to
a change which apparently is soon
to be a common condition, that of
having to put the log into an in-
creasingly heavy percentage of
small sizes.

The lumber market for the time
being is sort of drifting along, rest-
ing on its oars. Another two weeks
should see developments which
will indicate what to expect the re-
mainder of the year.

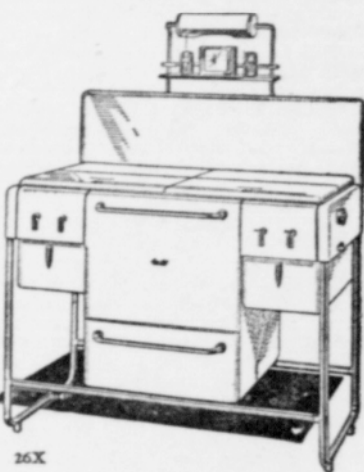
