The first of a series of winter wrestling cards for which the American Legion is sponsor will be staged Saturday night at the armory. Promoter Floyd Hunter had made arrangements with Virgil Hamlin, mat faestro for Portland, Seattle and Vancouver, to cooperate in securing high class talent for the events here.

Headlining the first all-star card Saturday will be Glenn Stone of Olympia and Larry Bennett of Salt Lake City. This will be a two-hour match.
