## Taxpayers Approve County Budget

**Provision Made for Home Demonstration Agent; Total Budget Is \$985,273.20.**

In an open meeting held Wednesday morning at the county court house in Eugene, the taxpayers voted to add \$1000 to the county budget for the coming year, and in this way provide for a home demonstration agent for Lane county.

Mrs. Vera Todd Crow, who is active in women's club work in Eugene, introduced the motion to establish a home demonstration office. Much discussion followed among the 75 taxpayers, the budget committee and the county officials who attended the meeting. This question has been before the people for some time, the office being discontinued about four years ago by the budget committee on the grounds that the county could not afford the expense.

All the other items included in the budget were accepted. The total budget stands at \$985,273.20. Each item was approved separately. Only one caused much debate and that pertained to the court house addition project.

Judge Fred Fisk issued a statement at the meeting to the effect that the county is on a sound financial basis. The outstanding warrants on October 1, 1935, were only \$47,565.54, as compared to \$147,686.27 a year ago.
