

## C. G. Lions Complete Football Season

Handicapped Team Chalks Up Two Wins, Two Ties and Four Defeats During 1935.

The Cottage Grove Lions finished their 1935 football season Friday with two games won, two tied and four lost.

Cottage Grove opened their season September 28 at Reedsport, where they played a 0-0 tie. October 4 the Lions went to Eugene, where they were defeated 18-6 by Eugene high. North Bend opened the Cottage Grove home season October 2 when they defeated the Lions 13-0. Roseburg also defeated the Cottage Grove team 13-0 on the home field October 18. The Lions' first victory came when they defeated Independence here by a score of 6-0.

University high came to Cottage Grove November 1 and played a 0-0 tie. Cottage Grove won a 13-0 game with Springfield November 11. Saint Mary's of Eugene was originally scheduled to play the Lions November 15 on Hayward field, Eugene, but injuries to players forced them to substitute the undefeated St. Mary's team from Beaverton, which defeated the Lions here 12-7.

The Lions made 32 points to their opponents' 56.

Cottage Grove was handicapped during the whole season by the loss of Kenneth Shortridge, star kicker and passer, who suffered a broken ankle in the first game. Other injuries handicapped the team from time to time.

Mason and McKibben were the most consistent players of the season. Mason was handicapped in the first two games by an injured shoulder but played brilliant offensive ball during the remainder of the season. McKibben, who started the season as a guard, was shifted to quarterback on the offense but still plays in the line of offense. Other players gave good account of themselves, but were not as outstanding as the two named.

## Government Buys 35 Isolated Farms

Approximately 17,000 acres of cutover, burned over and second growth forest land in western Lane county, including 35 or so isolated farms, will be purchased for the government through the resettlement administration.

The land will be part of a demonstration in land use, affecting 65,000 acres in the Coast Range mountains, lying in Lane, Tillamook, Yamhill and Lincoln counties. Options already signed voluntarily by owners of the land affected will be taken up. Farm families who accept the government offer of cash for their equities will be assisted, if they wish such aid, in finding better farms in other regions, probably in the same county, where roads and schools are available, markets close and social opportunities better.

Action must be voluntary. However, most of the families involved have welcomed the opportunity to sell and move out of areas where it has been difficult to make a living.

The demonstration area will be gradually closed to agriculture and allowed to revert to forest. Plans include reseeded of bare spots, fire protection, establishment of recreational facilities and other development. The boundaries of the nearby Siuslaw national forest may be extended to include the region.

## Lane City Millages Show Increases

Several of the principal cities of Lane show an increase in millages for 1936 budgets. The increase is brought about largely by decreases in assessed valuations, which automatically increase millages even though there be no increase in the amounts of money raised.

There would have been a material reduction in the Cottage Grove millage except for the necessity of making a substantial levy to cover delinquent street assessments. Eventually the delinquencies, or a large part of them, may be paid, in which case such payments will bring a reduction in future levies.
