Lorane Valley Gets Railroad

Lorane, Nov. 20. — (Special) — Lumber from the Lorane valley may hereafter go out by railroad, instead of being trucked to Cottage Grove. Railroad rates will be less than the cost of trucking. Already the Addison Lumber company has made arrangements with the J. H. Chambers & Son logging railway for a spur track and lumber will be shipped by rail as soon as this is completed. This is the railway used by J. H. Chambers & Son to supply logs for their own mill at Cottage Grove and has been several years reaching the Lorane valley, having been extended as necessary to reach Chambers timber.

A planer shed is being constructed by the Addison Lumber company and a larger planer is to be installed to handle lumber from both Addison mills.
