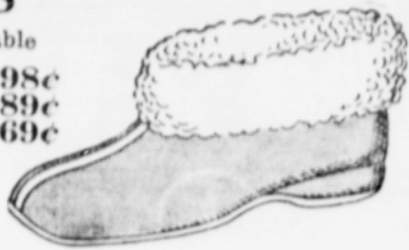

A survey of business property of the city for the purpose of giving a basis for equalization of assessments was started this week by James E. Bunnell, representative of the state tax commission. The survey is being made at the request of County Assessor Stevens. It will require about two weeks. These surveys have been made for various communities of the state and usually glaring inequalities are found.

Rainfall Record Made Wednesday

What is believed to be an all-time record for precipitation was reported yesterday from the Layng creek ranger station, 20 miles east of here in the Umpqua forest.

For a 24-hour period the rainfall was 1.91 inches. The previous record at that point was 1.21 inches, but this was equalled yesterday in eight hours.

Precipitation here was .82 of an inch yesterday and .5 of an inch today.

The Latham committee has for years conducted a home information center and last year a part of its material was moved to the Cottage Grove library. This service is to be continued and the library will be supplied with bulletins.

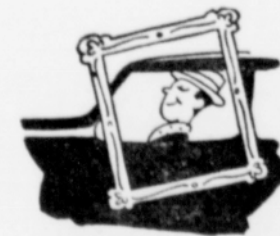
Miss Marian Notvedt of the high school faculty has offered services for those who would study home problems. This would be in addition to work she is already doing in home projects with high school girls.

Jacobs-Bennett Bout Ends in Draw

Headliners in American Legion Card Give Clean Exhibition; Women Wrestlers Are Fast.

One of the cleanest and one of the hardest fought wrestling bouts ever seen here was that in the American Legion's card Thursday last when Larry Bennett (180) of Salt Lake took on Fred (Marine) Jacobs (171), Cottage Grove, the match ending in a draw.

Jacobs took the first fall in 34 minutes with an Indian deathlock, a hold that is seldom used because of the difficulty in applying it.

The second fall went to Bennett in 18 minutes with a turnover scissors.

The remaining six minutes of the match were fast and furious as each man tried unsuccessfully to get the winning fall.

The two fought clean for the entire match.

In the preliminaries, three ten-minute rounds, Bill Avery of Eugene won from Cub McCubbin of Westfir with but three minutes remaining of the final round.

In the 30-minute semi-finals between two women, Violet Miller of San Francisco and Elva O'Brien of Seattle, the last named was winner. The first fall went to O'Brien in eight minutes, the second to Miller in four minutes and the third to O'Brien in four minutes. The two gave a fast, clean exhibition.
