Human Hearing Capacity

The average human hearing ca-
pacity ranges over nearly nine oc-
taves, varying in vibrations per
second from about 30 to more than
16,000. Ordinarily the human ear
is most sensitive to sound of a fre-
quency of from 1,000 to 2,000 cycles
a second. The soprano high "C" is
approximately at the lower of these
two frequencies.

Many Farmers Are Part Time

"More than 25 per cent of farm-
ers of Oregon are considered part-
time farmers in that their acre-
ages are too small to produce a
living."

This startling statement heads
the summary of a bulletin just is-
sued by Oregon State college ex-
periment station, entitled, "Part
Time Farming in Oregon."

Part-time farming in Oregon is
an established fact and not an ex-
periment, according to G. W. Kuhl-
man, who is senior author of the
bulletin and directed the actual
field study of 2,110 part-time farms
in the state where the family liv-
ing was obtained partly from the
farm and partly from outside labor
or other sources.

The average size of farms studied
was 10 acres. The average family
received only \$117 a year from the
sale of farm produce, \$597 from
wages and \$67 from miscellaneous
sources, while the farm produce
used is valued at \$173.

Lumber Output Is Up.

Seattle, Dec. 13.—The West Coast
Lumbermen's association today re-
ported 201 operating Washington
and Oregon mills last week pro-
duced 101,890,667 board feet of lum-
ber—about 17,000,000 more than
during Thanksgiving week.

Their average weekly output this
year has been 75,937,002 feet, com-
pared with 66,763,442 for the same
period of 1934.

The unfilled order file stood at
380,432,907 feet, about 11,800,000
over the previous week. Aggregate
inventories are 20 per cent less
than at this time last year, the as-
sociation reported.
