HOW HIGH IS UP? The ancient stage wheeze comes to life when one stands at "Bad Water" on the floor of Death Valley, California, 276 feet below sea level, and looks off on a clear day to the northwest where Mt. Whitney, king of the Sierra Nevada Mountains, rears his snowy head, 14,501 feet above sea level. The two points, the lowest and the highest in continental United States, are within sight of each other. Death Valley, one of the world's most dramatic scenic spectacles, available to tourist travel only in the winter months, was created a National Monument by Congress in February, 1933.

Soft Corn Now a Grave Certainty

Ear Silage May Be Required to Conserve Maximum Feeding Value.

This is now certain to be the seventh soft corn year since 1900, with the amount of soft and chaffy corn ranging from 10 to 50 per cent of the crop, according to estimates of crop and live stock specialists at the College of Agriculture, University of Illinois.

No class of live stock can utilize this soft corn as well as can cattle, and no method of salvaging the crop has been found superior to ear-corn silage. Trench silos or other temporary forms of silos may have to be put up on some farms to conserve the maximum feeding value of the immature corn.

Horses and mules offer scant outlets for soft corn, inasmuch as heavy death losses have resulted from feeding this class of live stock on damaged corn such as is found in almost every crib during a soft-corn year. Sheep are notoriously finicky about their feed and cannot utilize much soft corn except in the form of silage or as ear corn direct from the field before any spoilage has taken place. Hogs are better soft-corn users than horses and sheep, but trouble with scours and the inability of hogs to eat enough high-moisture corn to make fast gains have made soft corn unpopular with hog feeders.

As for the different methods of utilizing soft corn, the best one that was found in a long series of investigations at the agricultural college was ear-corn silage. Pasturing the soft corn in the field with cattle did not prove satisfactory. Shocking was dangerous, and cribbing was out of the question.

Silage made from the snapped ears, husk and all, kept as well as normal silage and made an excellent feed for beef cattle. There was practically as much feeding value in the dry matter of soft corn as in the dry matter of sound corn. However, because of the high moisture content of the soft corn, steers could not eat as much feed equivalent in that form as they could in the form of normally matured corn. Hence cattle fed soft corn do not gain as fast as those fed on sound corn.

An acre of soft corn may have as much dry matter in the ears as an acre of mature corn. If this dry matter is conserved and properly fed, it will produce practically as much beef as an acre of sound corn.

Expert Tells Why Horses' Feet Require Great Care

Horses are shod primarily to prevent the hoof from wear, although many farm horses working in fields and on dirt roads are never shod. In addition to protection, says R. B. Cooley, professor of animal husbandry at Purdue university, shoes, if calked, provide a grip on soft ground or ice. If calks are sharp. By virtue of the weight they impose shoes serve to balance and govern the stride and to accentuate the size and shape of the foot.

Hereditary transmission plays an important part with the foot of a horse. There is probably no serious defect in conformation that is transmitted with any more regularity than are small, shallow, shelly feet. Obviously, it is important to mate good footed seed stock in order that one may reasonably expect the offspring with good feet.

In a state of nature wear does not exceed growth. Even when born with good feet, most colts require their feet trimmed and leveled occasionally, more especially during their period of rapid growth. This aids in preventing the development of rather serious foot and leg malformations not easily corrected later.

Colts Can Get Too Fat

It is possible for a colt to get too fat. Some mares milk much heavier than others, and if the colt is still nursing and eats quite a bit of grain, it is very apt to get overweight. When colts are too fat, they are apt to go wrong in their legs, especially the hocks, even though they may get considerable exercise, says A. L. Harvey, Division of Animal Husbandry, University Farm, St. Paul. Although a twelve-weeks-old colt is rather young to wean, in this case you wean it and turn it out where it will get plenty of exercise. After it gets rid of most of the excess fat, increase the feed and see that it continues to get lots of exercise.
