250 Farmers Take Part in Conference

Two hundred fifty Lane county
farmers participated in the farm
conference held at Eugene on Tues-
day and Wednesday of last week
for the purpose of analyzing the
agriculture of the county.

The purpose of the conference
was to consider facts relating to
Lane county agriculture and plan
a program which will tend to ef-
fect a balance between production
and market demand so as to ob-
tain the greatest returns from the
efforts and resources of the farm-
ers of the county.

Tuesday morning was devoted to
addresses by W. A. Schoenfeld,
dean and director of the school of
agriculture of Oregon State col-
lege, and O. S. Fletcher, county
agent, on the economic conference
purposes and plans and on the
general agricultural situation in
Lane county. That afternoon 119
farmers took part in ten group
meetings under the leadership of
standing committees that had been
appointed previously and that had
assembled much valuable infor-
mation. In these group meetings re-
ports were proposed that were sub-
mitted the second day of the con-
ference.

A. S. Burrier, land planning con-
sultant of the resettlement division,
spoke at the first session of the
conference on Wednesday on "The
General Outlook for Agriculture,
Land Utilization, and Farm Cred-
it." Following this address the re-
mainder of the day was devoted to
reading and consideration of com-
mittee reports.
