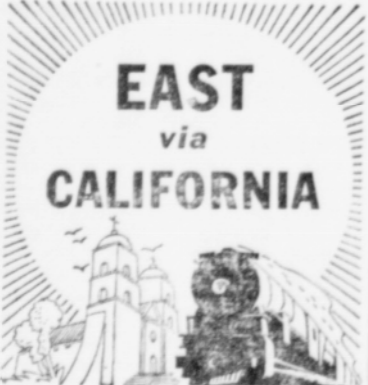

were not passed on. To be fair to business, the tax should be one that the seller would not be permitted to assume.

The Sentinel likes the feature of the proposed sales tax bill that excludes food stuffs from provisions of the bill. Of course, motor fuel oils, that already pay 25 per cent to 30 per cent tax, would be excluded.

The Sentinel's inclination is to wish to see sales tax presented in a more satisfactory form, but would favor the bill if that were the only way to get money for old age pensions.

Bill authorizing student activity fees in state higher educational institutions.—306-307.

This is an exceedingly controversial issue. There seem to be good arguments on both sides. Opponents argue that making the student fee compulsory works a hardship upon students who are cramped for funds. The maximum fee would be \$15 a year. In many cases that might be a burden, especially when added to other fees which the student must pay.

Proponents of the bill argue that no student should be without the things which the fee provides, that the things which the fee provides are necessary to a well-rounded education. The fee was compulsory until the attorney general cast doubt upon its constitutionality. The student fee would admit the student to all athletic contests, but would also support lectures, concerts, oratory, debate, dramatics, bands, orchestras, glee clubs, and student publications, all important in education.

It is pointed out by proponents that, with a compulsory fee, all students would be on the same basis so far as these added activities are concerned, while, if the fee were not compulsory, the fee would have to be so increased to those who did pay that the extra activities would be only for those well provided with funds.

Whether or not the fee should be imposed, and in what amount not exceeding \$5 a term would be optional with the state board of higher education. The Sentinel believes it would be sensible to give the state board, charged with conduct of our institutions of higher learning, every opportunity to do those things which seem best for

the institutions and those attending them.
