Ed Adams Succumbs Following Operation

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon for Ed Adams, long time resident here, who died Friday in a Eugene hospital, where he had undergone an operation. Rev. I. G. Shaw of Springfield, former pastor here, officiated and interment was in the pioneer Taylor-Lane cemetery. The Odd Fellows lodge had charge of graveside services.

Mr. Adams was born March 4, 1887, at Terry, Kans., and had been a resident here 40 years. He was married at London March 4, 1897, to Emily Shortridge, who survives. In recent years the family had lived two miles south of here. Mr. Adams was a member of the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs.

Surviving are the mother, Mrs. M. E. Adams, this city; six children, Norman L. Adams, Los Angeles; Mrs. Royal Abene, Sutherland; Glen, Clair, Roy and Rex, at home; a sister, Miss Stella Adams, this city; three brothers, Lyman Adams, this city; Emil Adams, Klamath Falls; Herbert Adams, Portland.

J. S. Medley Was Pioneer Attorney

John S. Medley, 77, pioneer attorney of Cottage Grove, died Monday forenoon in Eugene, where he had been a resident a number of years. He had been in failing health for a number of years, but had attended to his legal practice until a few weeks ago. Funeral services were held Wednesday in Eugene and interment was also there.

Mr. Medley was born March 16, 1859, in Scotland county, Mo. He came to Oregon in 1874 with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Medley. He came to Cottage Grove in the early days and the building on the west side in which he conducted his legal practice is still standing there, the painted sign thereon having nearly disappeared through the ravages of time. In 1916 he was appointed assistant to District Attorney J. M. Devers and moved to Eugene and later was himself elected district attorney.

During his residence here Mr. Medley was active in civic affairs. The chamber of commerce here sent flowers for the funeral.

Mr. Medley was married here in 1895 to Katherine Hanson.

Surviving are the widow; two sisters, Mrs. Adelaide Cleaver, Prairie City, Ore., and Mrs. Martha Littlefield, Eugene; three brothers, W. H. Medley, this city; Henry Medley, Portland, and Claude Medley, Jacksonville.
