Portland, Ore., Feb. 5.—Deputy Coroner Snooker said Tuesday the body of a man fatally injured in a traffic accident early Monday was identified as Edward Lightfoot, 55, miner who came here from the Cottage Grove area to undergo treatment for injuries suffered in a mining mishap.

Benny Dotson, former pugilist, was charged with involuntary manslaughter in connection with the accident.

Hopes for early permanent flood control operations on the Willamette river and its tributaries were dealt another severe blow Wednesday when it was learned that United States army engineers had recommended against any further channel or flood control improvement between Springfield and Eugene at this time. The engineer's report, made public by Colonel Thomas M. Robbins, division engineer of Portland, was received in bulletin form by John F. Durr, secretary-manager of the Eugene chamber of commerce.

The report was that for which a hearing was held in Eugene in December.
