Every organization in Salem that has a drive of any kind, or has tickets to sell to a supper, or tickets on a raffle, finds state officers to be their "meat." Soaking state officers is really something of a racket. And the racketeers even come from Portland and other cities of the state.

So an elective state officer, under present conditions, not only has a difficult time paying expenses out of his salary, but hasn't a chance to recoup for the expense of the campaign in which he was elected.

Financially a person can't afford to accept state office at present salaries.

## Press clipping racket—

WHAT IS SAID TO be one of the best rackets is the press clipping racket.

The beauty of this racket is that it is fully within the law.

Another beauty of the racket is that its expenses are small, while its returns are said to be large.

The racket has proved so profitable that many have entered the field and the Portland Better Business bureau has felt it to be its duty to warn the public against such concerns.

Perhaps some person in Cottage Grove has received a circular from one of these so-called press clipping bureaus informing him that if he would send 25 cents the bureau would send a press clipping of interest to him.

If anyone here has taken the bait he probably received an item clipped from a Eugene paper telling that he was a visitor there a week or two before.

One of these so-called press clipping bureaus starts business by writing to newspapers asking that free copies of such newspapers be sent such bureau. The bait to the newspaper is that it will receive wide publicity through the clippings this so-called clipping bureau will mail to its customers.

Some newspapers fall for the gag.

Mostly they do not. Evidently these so-called clipping bureaus get hold of exchanges thrown away by newspapers, or actually subscribe for newspapers in some of the larger cities.

At any rate they get hold of the newspapers some way and when they have the papers they are ready for business and soon the 25-cent pieces begin to roll in.

BUT THERE ARE legitimate press clipping bureaus that perform a real service.

Probably few in Cottage Grove are interested in a clipping service, but any person that is will find that he doesn't get clippings at so much per clipping.

The legitimate clipping bureaus don't do business that way.

Any one who receives a letter that offers to send him a clipping for a small cash payment may be certain that the letter is from a gyp outfit.

Anyone who wishes clippings from a legitimate clipping bureau will find that he has to pay a service charge for which he will get a real clipping service.

All the newspapers of any importance furnish their papers to these legitimate bureaus, receiving in return a clipping service that is worth something.

Allen's Press Clipping bureau, with offices in the principal cities, is the outstanding bureau on the coast.

Each office employs a bunch of attractive girls who spend their time cutting newspapers into clippings.
