Whereas gray digger ground
squirrels (Citellus douglasii) are
noxious rodents in Lane county,
Oregon.

Now, therefore, all of such per-
sons, firms, copartnerships, cor-
porations and companies owning or
having dominion over land in said
Lane county, Oregon, are hereby
required to take steps to extermi-
nate said gray digger ground
squirrels (Citellus douglasii) with-
in thirty days from the date of the
first publication of this notice. If
such steps are not taken, a person
or persons appointed by the county
court of said Lane county will en-
ter upon said lands and proceed to
exterminate said gray digger
ground squirrels (Citellus dou-
glasii) and the cost of said extermi-
nation will be levied against said
lands.

The county agricultural agent
hereby designates Monday, April 6,
as a day to be known as "squirrel
poisoning day" throughout the said
Lane county, and it is hereby re-
commended that poisoned barley, as
prepared by the undersigned and
representatives of the bureau of
biological survey of the United
States department of agriculture,
be used for the purpose of such ex-
termination. Such poisoned barley
may be secured from the under-
signed at his office in Eugene,
Lane county, Oregon, at approxi-
mately the cost of preparation.

Good Way to Save Straw Is to Use for Bedding

What to do with surplus straw is a
big problem on many farms. Some
farmers burn straw; others do not
believe this is wise. S. R. Cleland,
farm management specialist of the
agricultural extension service, Uni-
versity Farm, St. Paul, recommends
that farms having surplus straw use
it very liberally as bedding for live
stock, thereby getting as much of it
as possible mixed with the manure.

Such a plan not only gets rid of
a lot of straw, but keeps the live
stock more comfortable. Moreover,
it provides for getting the straw
back on the land, when the manure
is spread, thereby returning consid-
erable humus and some fertility to
replace that removed by grain crop.
Another great advantage of this lib-
eral use of bedding is that it helps
save the very valuable animal ma-
nure, especially through soaking up
the liquids which are especially rich
in nitrogen and phosphorus.

This suggestion is endorsed by
live stock husbandmen and by
George H. Nesom, extension soils
specialist, who says another good
way to convert straw into manure
is to allow live stock to run to the
stack. In this way a large amount
of straw will be trampled under-
foot and mixed with manure from
the animals.

Soy Beans for Horses

Horses and mules can best utilize
the soy bean crop as hay rather
than as grain, says Iowa State col-
lege. The grain is high in protein,
hence should be fed in limited
quantities, and then only when bal-
ance of ration is deficient in pro-
tein. Soy bean hay has proved sat-
isfactory for horses when other
roughage such as timothy hay, oat
straw or corn fodder is used for 50
per cent of the roughage require-
ment. Soy bean straw has given
good results as a wintering rough-
age for idle work animals when
some oat straw and some grain are
fed in addition.

Garget in Cattle

Garget in cattle is an inflamma-
tion of the mammary gland. It is
often denoted by pain and swelling
of the udder, clotted milk, and fre-
quently by the loss of the quarter or the
entire udder. As a rule, writes C. P.
Fitch, veterinarian, University
Farm, St. Paul, people do not
drink milk from animals affected
with this disease. Ordinarily milk
is not considered desirable for hu-
man consumption when it is visibly
changed from the normal.
