S. P. Pays Huge Tax.

Southern Pacific enriched the coffers of tax collecting agencies March 15 by payment of \$1,170,946.37 in taxes, representing the total 1935 tax payment on the company's properties in Oregon. These properties carry a tax valuation of \$31,737,717.

Southern Pacific's tax payment is 2.91 per cent of all taxes levied in the state and is 6.71 per cent of all taxes levied in counties through which it operates a railroad, except Multnomah. The taxes represent an average of \$756.98 taxes per mile of main track.

"Character development is the parent's greatest responsibility and should begin in infancy," Mrs. Emma Van Dalen Jones told a large group of women and girls in her lecture, "The King's Daughters," given Sunday afternoon at the Presbyterian church.

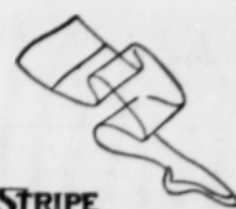
Questions pertaining to women and her sphere were discussed. Mrs. Jones said:

"Correct dress is a background for personality, and simplicity marks refinement. While dress should be becoming, its basic purpose is to cover and not reveal. Youth must be correctly informed of dangers attending moral laxity. Clean moral living is the only sure preventative of venereal infections, to which many serious diseases can be directly traced. Increasing delinquency and moral upheavals among youth are attributable to the breaking down of homes and is due to lack of proper parental care and religious training." Mrs. Jones advocated more careful supervision and said parents should know where their children are, the character, morals and health of their associates.

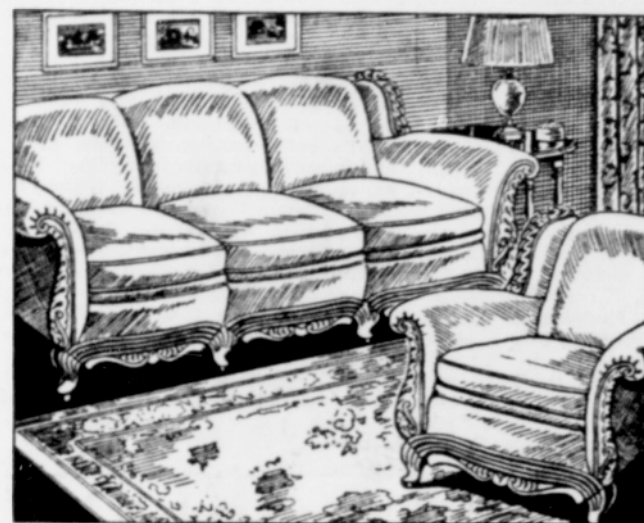
