Easter Sunrise Meeting.

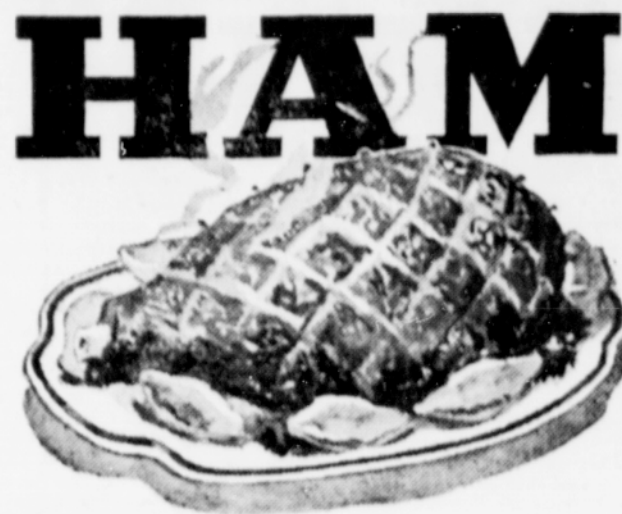
