

Stored Machinery Urged for Winter

Truck Crop Equipage Can Be Cleaned and Placed Out of Weather.

Growers of truck crops and potatoes who have expensive spraying and dusting machinery can prevent serious damage to such equipment by proper preparation and storage of these machines for winter.

Potato producers have purchased between 75 and 100 spraying machines during the past two years. Precautions against freezing and corrosion may be taken by carefully draining, washing and oiling sprayers, before storing them under cover for the winter.

Pet cocks on the pump, filter wells and the engine should be opened so the water can drain out. The equipment then should be thoroughly washed out, and oil should be introduced into the pumps to prevent corrosion. Old crank case oil may be used. Nozzles should be removed and taken apart and all metal pieces placed in kerosene or oil.

Dusters should be emptied of all dusts since the dust tends to cake. Otherwise materials such as lime and sulphur will absorb water from the air and be difficult to remove.

Leftover insecticides may be saved for insect control work next year by carefully storing them this winter. Dry dust materials should be placed in metal cans where they may be absolutely dry. Liquid sprays such as lime sulphur and oil emulsions are better if they are protected from freezing. All liquids should be sealed to prevent loss through evaporation.

Although liquid lime sulphur apparently is not injured by freezing, it is believed that it is better to store it in a protected place, such as a potato dugout or cellar. Dry lime sulphur should be kept in the driest place possible to prevent it from absorbing water, which destroys its insecticidal properties.

Barrel Storage of Small Quantities of Vegetables

For storing small quantities of vegetables the so-called vertical barrel or box storage is becoming popular, according to the department of horticulture at the Ohio State university.

Apples, root crops, potatoes, and even cabbage may be stored in them, the department states.

The box or barrel, filled with vegetables to be stored, is plugged and sunk into the ground about half its depth. The exposed part is covered with straw to a depth of about six inches. Earth a foot deep is mounded over the straw as soon as cold weather approaches.

Protecting Fruit Trees

The only safe way to prevent rabbits from gnawing the bark off the trunks of young fruit trees is to wrap the base of the trunks from the ground to a height of about 18 to 20 inches. Where the branches are less than 18 inches above the soil, the wrappers should include both trunk and branches to a height of about 18 to 20 inches. Various kinds of wrapping material may be used, advises a writer in the Missouri Farmer. Some of the most common are one-inch mesh poultry wire, galvanized window screen wire, galvanized wire netting having three or four meshes to the inch, hardware cloth, old newspapers, gunny sacks torn in strips six to eight inches wide, and cornstalks.

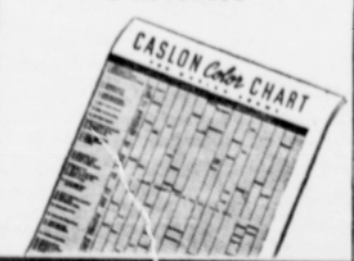
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Richard Pentico Dies

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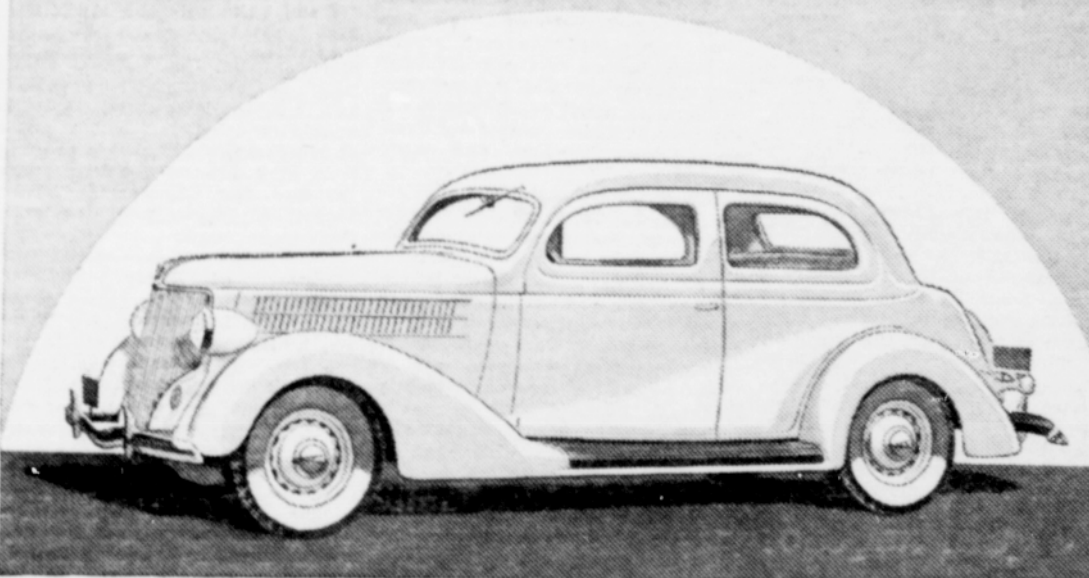
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
