Balladeers Present Enjoyable Concert

Local Songsters Please Music Lovers With Program Presented at Arcade Theater.

Opening with the traditional "Song of the Road" by Stevenson-Protheroe, the Balladeers presented to a small but appreciative audience their sixth semi-annual concert in the Arcade theater Sunday afternoon.

Following the "Song of the Road" was the soothing "Serenade" by De Loss Smith, with a melodious duet sung by Mr. Edwards and Mr. Butler, supported by the chorus. The first group was concluded with the stirring "Pilgrim's Song" by Tchaikowsky from the Russian of Leo Tolstoy. Through the smooth flowing chords of this inspiring number, motivated by a contra-bass effect and tempered by the restrained piano accompaniment, a climax was reached in the startling magnificence of the high tenor work at the end. The number was very effectively finished with a repetition of the quiet strains of the original theme by the piano.

The second group began with a well blended quartet number, "When Song Is Sweet," sung by Messrs. Stewart, Butler, Carl and Trask. Then the popular "Oregon Trail" with incidental tenor solo by Mr. Butler was sung by the chorus. Third of this group was a lilting negro melody, "Little David," with soprano obligato by Mrs. Edna Pearson. The American cowboy folk song, "Home on the Range," concluded the group.

Frederick Dallas of Eugene, who also appeared on the fall program as assisting artist, played "The Old Oaken Bucket," with added variations which were cleverly executed. The beautiful "Melody" by Dawes next won the approval of the audience. Mr. Dallas' interpretation of the Mexican number, "Estrelaita" by Ponce, so captivated the audience that he was brought back to play it a second time.

The other assisting artist, Robert Mack, tenor, of Eugene, sang two numbers, the ever popular "The Sleigh" by Kountz, and the haunting melody of the tenor solo, "Star of My Life" by Leo Sileu, with a violin obligato by Mr. Dallas. This number called forth the encore, "Goodbye, Girls, I'm Through," by Caryl. These artists were ably accompanied by Miss Dorothy Davis of Eugene.

A very fitting conclusion following Easter was Mozart's "Gloria in Excelsis" (Twelfth Mass) which was sung in true Mozart style.

The concert was directed by Edna Leslie Pearson of Eugene, and the accompanist was Mrs. Helen Rice of Cottage Grove.

The Balladeers are unanimous in attributing their success as a chorus to the zeal of their director, Mrs. Pearson, who has for three years been their mentor and has imparted to them a considerable amount of her well known musical ability and love for really good music. Her direction was faultless. The excellent work of Mrs. Helen Rice of this city as accompanist should not be overlooked as a decided factor in making the concert a success.

Members of the Balladeers stated they wish to thank Mr. Morelock of the Arcade for his public spiritedness in giving them the free use of the Arcade.

The Balladeers will present the same program this evening (Thursday) at Lorane.
