CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"DOCTRINE OF ATONEMENT" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, April 19.

The Golden Text was, "The preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness; but unto us which are saved it is the power of God" (I Cor. 1:18).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are become new; behold, all things are of God, who hath reconciled us to himself by Jesus Christ, and hath given to us the ministry of reconciliation" (II Cor. 5:17, 18).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "The atonement of Christ reconciles man to God, not God to man; for the divine Principle of Christ is God, and how can God propitiate Himself? Christ is Truth, which reaches no higher than itself. The fountain can rise no higher than its source. Christ, Truth, could conciliate no nature above his own, derived from the eternal Love. It was therefore Christ's purpose to reconcile man to God, not God to man" (p. 18, 19).
