Mr. Orcher of Singapore, who recently arrived in America, spoke to the assembly Friday on the situation in the far east. He stated that America stands more or less as an ideal to the far east. He gave brief descriptions of various well known islands, stating that Java has more people per square mile than any other country in the world. He told of the life of the natives and explained some of their games. He also enumerated the difficulties of establishing schools and educating the people. He believes that cooperation is the only way to maintain peace and brotherhood.

Mrs. Fitzgerald, the health nurse, assisted Dr. Schade.

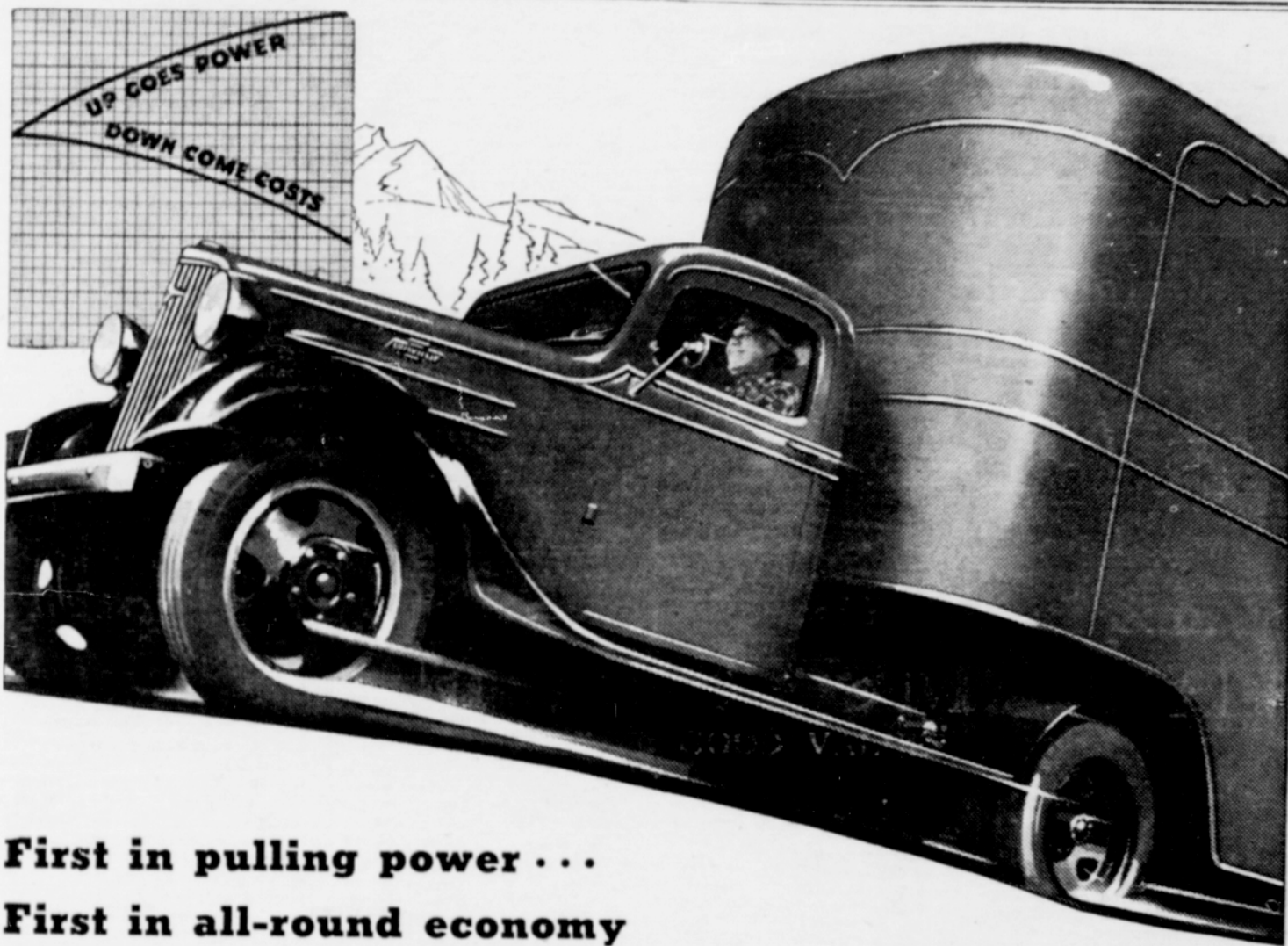

Mice are afraid of bass drums, firecrackers and men with pink beards.



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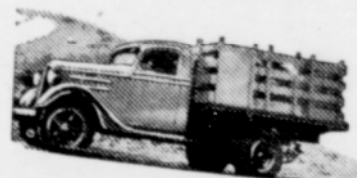
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
