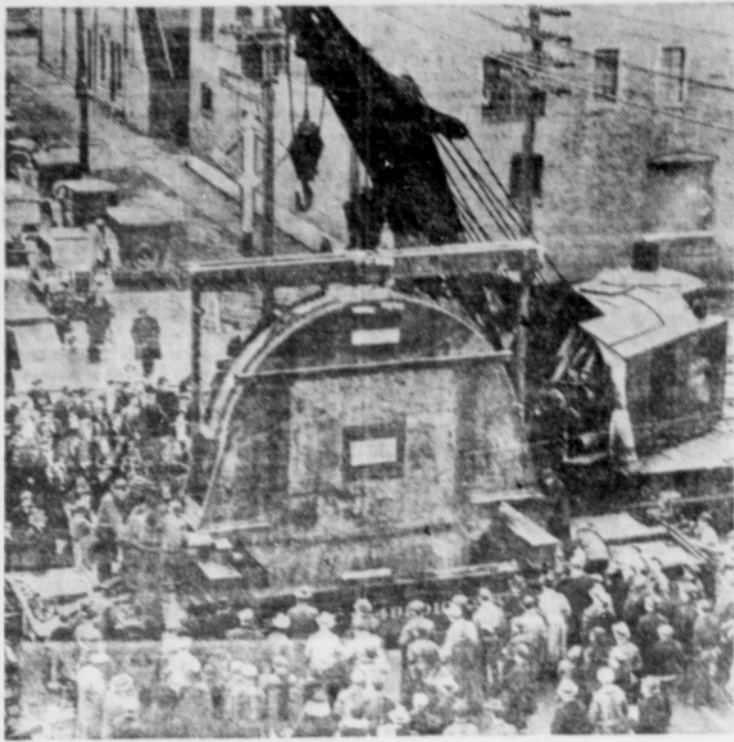


## Shipping Giant Lens to California
