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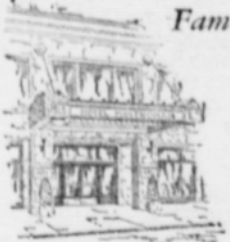

Lions Win District Relay at Eugene Eight Go to State

Local High School Secures Nearly Double Points of Nearest Competitor

By virtue of their sweeping victory in the district track meet held at Hayward Field, Eugene, Wednesday, the Cottage Grove Lions will be permitted to enter B. Thies, Mackin, Caton, D. Thies, Mason, V. Guggisberg, Minney and Decker in the state meet to be held at Corvallis May 16 and 17. Only winners of first and second place in district meets qualify for entry in the state meet, and Cottage Grove will be represented by twice as many boys as any other school in the district.

In the meet Wednesday, Cottage Grove annexed 58½ points to 30 2-3 for Roseburg, 26½ for Eugene, 19 for Springfield, 17 1-3 for University High and 2 for Reedsport.

Mackin placed first and Chapman third for the Lions in the 880. The time was 2:08. Caton took first in the Broad Jump. Distance: 20 feet, 6½ inches. Mason placed second in the 220 dash. Time 24.5. V. Guggisberg placed first in the javelin event. The distance was 144 feet, 7 inches.

Caton placed first in the 220 low hurdles, with Decker placing fourth in the same event. The time was 27.7. D. Thies tied with Sanders of Eugene for first in the pole vault, and Tracy tied with Van Fleet of Eugene for third in the same event. The height was 9 feet, 6 inches.

Chapman placed third in the 440. The time was 54.3. Caton took first in the 100 yard dash. The time was 10.7. B. Thies took first and McKibben fourth in the 120 high hurdles. The time was 18.7. Mackin took first in the mile, with Ruth taking third. The time was 4:51.5.

Mason, Decker, Minney and Caton comprising the relay team took that event with Eugene placing second. The time was 1:38.3.

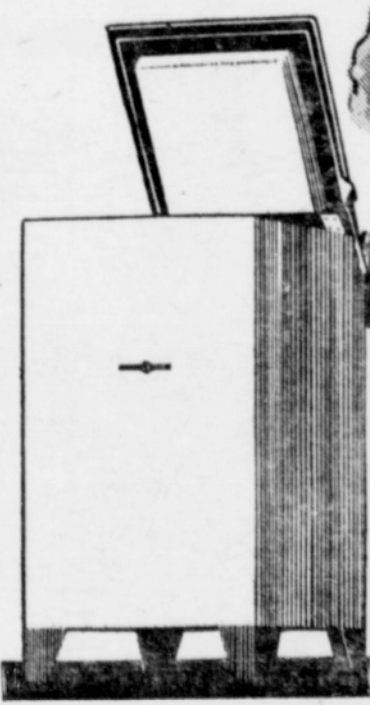
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
