National State News

Oregon Professor Honored.

Dr. N. L. Bossing of the University has written a book entitled "Progressive Methods of Teaching in Secondary Schools," which has been chosen for a place on the annual selection of outstanding educational books, made by the National Education association and the American Library association. Dr. Bossing's book was of 60 selected from a list of more than 700 written during the past few months.

Old Age Pensions Doubled.

A partial survey by the state relief committee shows that assistance pensions for the aged needy have doubled under the new program which went into effect April 1. The former average of around \$10 is now around \$20.54. The maximum is still \$30. On April 1 the federal government began a program of providing 50 per cent of the expenditures for old age pensions. The state supplies 25 per cent and the counties 25 per cent. Prior to that date the counties bore the entire burden. April payments were made to persons previously on the county rolls. New applicants will be considered this month. Oregon law, now supported by a similar federal act, permits pensions to aged needy persons 70 years of age or older up to \$30. As each case is handled on actual need few cases reach that mark.

Prison Population.

On April 30 there were 533 prisoners in the state penitentiary, with more than 100 serving life sentences. In 1930 there were 957 prisoners, the high record for Oregon.

16 More Warships.

An AP dispatch says that the British navy will require an additional appropriation from parliament of 10,300,000 pounds sterling (about \$51,500,000) for the building of 16 warships.

It is reported that five officials of the Italian ministry of finance have been arrested on a charge that they had taken part in the formation of a Masonic lodge. Mussolinism and Masonry do not mix. We can still be glad that we do not live in Italy.

Refrigerator Cars.

The Pacific Fruit Express company is spending \$10,000,000 for the construction of 2700 new refrigerator cars. Seven hundred will be built at Roseville and Los Angeles, 500 at Renton, Wash., and the rest at Chicago. They will go into service this summer. It is to be hoped that enough fruit for home consumption will be left in Oregon.

Fast Train Schedule.

The Santa Fe railroad will inaugurate, May 12, a 39 3/4 hour schedule between Los Angeles and Chicago.

Utilities Prosperous.

Frank C. McColloch, state utility commissioner, reports that revenues of utilities operating in Oregon for 1935 were the most satisfactory since 1931, and showed a substantial increase over 1934.

"Let's Quit Killing."

For the last week in April Seattle and Portland totaled 288 automobile accidents each. In Portland 62 were injured and 51 in Seattle. During the eight week "let's quit killing" competition, started March 1, there were 11 killed in Seattle and five in Portland.

Wise Decision.

According to C. H. Murphy, president of the Greater Willamette Valley association, hundreds

of eastern farm families have indicated they will settle in western Oregon this spring and summer.

Oregon Broadcast.

Part of the story of Oregon's natural resources and the effect of the land grant college program on their development will be told to the entire nation over NBC network May 20. On that day Oregon State college will have charge of a full hour's program on the National Farm and Home hour, which is carried from coast to coast from 9:30 to 10:30 in the morning, Pacific standard time.

Bulletin on Tree Injury.

A timely bulletin, in view of the widespread injury to certain types of trees caused by last fall's freeze, is an extension publication just issued at OSC entitled, "Physical Injuries to Trees, with Special Reference to Winter Injury."

A Roman Peace

The Italian army after a few months of a ruthless, bloody war, waged by overwhelming numbers with modern arms have marched through Ethiopia leaving death and desolation behind it. Addis Ababa, the Ethiopian capital has been captured. Mussolini, addressing the people of Italy, said: "I announce that peace has been reestablished. It is not without emotion and not without pride that after seven months of fierce hostilities I pronounce this great word, but it is strictly necessary for me to add that it is our peace and a Roman peace which is expressed in this simple, irrevocable, definitive phrase: 'Ethiopia is Italian.'"

Americanization Classes.

Approximately 1,300 foreign-born adults are attending Americanization classes regularly each week in preparation for citizenship, according to C. A. Howard, superintendent of public instruction, whose department has general charge of the state Americanization program, in cooperation with the state board of Americanization. Principal nationalities found in the 101 Americanization classes being taught in the program this year are Italian, Swedish, Russian, German, Finnish, Canadian, English, Scottish, Norwegian, Danish, Greek and Irish.

City Council

At the regular session of the city council Monday a Petition was presented asking that the Pastime, 533 Main street, be not granted a liquor license. The petition was ordered filed.

An application for a package store class A license and for a retail beer license for Rex cafe, 521 Main street, was approved.

The resignation of Councilman E. R. Lemley was tabled until the next meeting.

Effective May 20 water users are allowed the 1935 irrigation rates.

Ordinance No. 1140 was passed. It provides for the licensing of "distributors or owners to sell, lease, distribute, place or locate for operation, or to operate in the city of Cottage Grove any pin ball game, device or machine, the playing or operation of which involves an element of skill."

Aside from the above the regular routine business was dispatched.

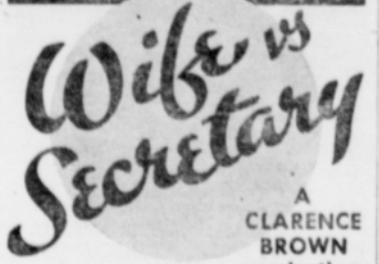
