The Cottage Grove Lions placed second in the Willamette Valley Track Meet at Corvallis Saturday, piling up a total of 27 points. Salem was first with 44 points, Corvallis third with 18½ and Roseburg fourth with 15½.

Jack Caton was high point man of the meet with 11 ¾ points. He placed first in the broadjump, 2nd in the low hurdles and 100 yard dash and a place in the second relay team.

Half Productive Area Northwest States Is Forest Land, Dana

Timber Industry Fourth in Nation Both in Value of Product and Labor Employed.

The "present key importance of the forestry industry in the economy of the Pacific northwest region" is a highlight of the Columbia basin report, which has been released for publication as of May 6 by Marshall N. Dana, district chairman of national resources committee.

The report deals with the four states of Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington, which contain an area equal to 13 per cent of the entire continental domain of the United States. In contrast, it has less than 3 per cent of the total population. It is, according to the report, a region primarily devoted to the production of raw materials, of which the chief are forestry products, grain, fruits, minerals and fish.

The report shows that forest land in the four Columbia basin states totals 93 million acres. Half of this land is in national forest; a third of it is privately owned, and the rest is in some other form of public ownership. Not all of this land grows merchantable timber. Some of the forests are chiefly important for their recreational value or as factors in flood and erosion control. However, the Columbia basin area contains an estimated 917 billion board feet of merchantable timber, as against a total of only 1,668 billion feet for the entire country. It is pointed out that although private ownership accounts for but one-third of the ownership, it has much of the best and most accessible merchantable timber and therefore is an important factor in any plan for management and use of this resource.

MORE RAIN FALLS FIRST WEEK OF MAY THAN IN APRIL

Heavy showers of the past week has brought the precipitation for May to date above the mark for the entire month of April, according to C. E. Stewart, local weather observer, who reported 2.46 inches up to 8 o'clock this morning (Thursday) as compared with 2.41 inches for the previous month.

The April report in full follows: Mean maximum, 63.7 degrees; Mean minimum, 40; Mean, 51.8; Maximum, 75; Minimum, 25; precipitation, 2.41 inches; clear days, 12; part cloudy, 11; cloudy, 7.

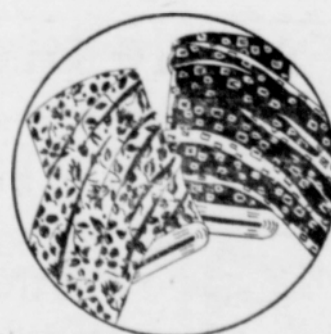
