"A DAM AND FALLEN MAN"

A was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, May 10.

The Golden Text was, "Cease ye from man, whose breath is in his nostrils: for wherein is he to be accounted of?" (Isa. 2:22).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "And God said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness... So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them. And God saw every thing that he had made, and, behold, it was very good" (Gen. 1:26, 27, 31).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "The creations of matter arise from a mist or false claim, or from mystification, and not from the firmament, or understanding, which God erects between the true and false. In error everything comes from beneath, not from above... Throughout the first chapter of Genesis and in three verses of the second,—in what we understand to be the spiritually scientific account of creation,—it is Elohim (God) who creates. From the fourth verse of chapter two to chapter five, the creator is called Jehovah, or the Lord" (pg. 523.)

The missionary society of the Methodist church will conduct a meeting Friday evening at 8 o'clock to which the general public has been invited. Miss Bernice Cornelson, a missionary on furlough from Peru, will be the guest speaker and relate her personal experiences and tell of the devel-

Against Misleading Information.

Washington, D. C., May 5.—The United States civil service commission has sent a notice to postoffices, warning that misleading information is being given the public by representatives of some of the correspondence schools which sell "civil service" courses.

For a long time the commission has been receiving complaints from different parts of the country which indicate that opportunities for obtaining federal employment have been greatly exaggerated.

It was made clear that no school has any connection whatever with the civil service commission or with any other branch of the government, and also that the commission has no agents who solicit applications for civil service positions or

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who sell "civil service" courses.

No school can guarantee government employment and none is given information regarding examinations, or any other information, which is not available to the general public. The commission stated that it does not recommend any school and explained that it is not necessary for anyone to take a course with a so-called civil service school in order to compete in a civil service examination.

A special point was made of the fact that information concerning examinations may be obtained at any time, without cost, from the secretary of the civil service board at any first or second class postoffice or from the commission's office in Washington, D. C.

Oregonian Wins Prize.

The coveted Pulitzer prize of \$1000 for the best novel of the year was awarded H. L. Davis, native of Yoncalla, Ore., for his book, "Honey in the Horn." Mr. Davis was born in 1896 and prior to his career as writer led a diversified life. He was a farm hand, cowboy, deputy-sheriff, government surveyor, newspaper editor and railroad construction hand. He attended

Stanford university but before he was graduated left to serve in the world war. Mr. Davis has also had a number of poems published and in 1932 won a Simon Guggenheim memorial foundation award, calling for research in Mexico. Mr.

Davis resided in Seattle a few years and was reported in Mexico last year. Friends did not know his immediate address.
