N. J. Nelson Sr. Passes Away

Nelson Jorgen Nelson, resident of this city for a number of years and father of N. J. Peter E. and Homer C. Nelson of this city, passed away Wednesday forenoon. Mr. Nelson had been in ill health for several months and recently underwent a major operation.

Mr. Nelson was born April 1, 1861, at Horsens, Denmark. He came to this country at the age of 20 and settled in Woodbury county, Iowa. He was married in 1884 to Mrs. Anna Iverson and to them three children were born: Mrs. Elmer Cook, Bowden, Alberta; Mrs. H. M. Johnson, Sargents Bluff, Iowa; N. J. Nelson, Cottage Grove. Mrs. Nelson died in 1890. In 1892 Mr. Nelson was married to Laura Cook, who died at the home in Springfield a few weeks ago. To this union was born six children, four surviving as follows: P. E. Nelson, and Homer C. Nelson, of this city; Mrs. Mitchell Wilkins, Florida; Mrs. L. H. Neet, Springfield.

Mr. Nelson spent his early life farming. He moved to Hamilton, Montana in 1908 and resided there a few months coming to Oregon later in the same year. He located in Coburg where he operated a hardware and furniture store. Later he organized the Coburg State Bank of which he was president. A fire in 1914 wiped out the business district of that little city and Mr. Nelson then engaged in farming near Coburg. He came to Cottage Grove in 1921 and operated a truck garden on east Main street until 1928 when he and Mrs. Nelson went to Florida and made their home for two years with their daughter, Mrs. Wilkins. They returned to Oregon two years later and resided in Springfield and Cottage Grove until time of death.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 p. m. at Mills chapel. Rev. H. W. Davis will officiate and interment will be in the Masonic cemetery at Eugene.

A large crew of linemen, including men from Cottage Grove, were hurried to the scene and trucks soon pulled the poles and tangled wires out of the way of the train. The men were still at work late Wednesday.
