"MORTALS AND IMMORTALS" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, May 17.

The Golden Text was, "What man knoweth the things of a man, save the spirit of man which is in him? even so the things of God knoweth no man, but the Spirit of God" (1 Cor. 2:11).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Man that is born of a woman is of few days, and full of trouble. He cometh forth like a flower, and is cut down; he fleeth also as a shadow, and continueth not" (Job 14:1, 2).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures", by Mary Baker Eddy: "Mortal man is the antipode of immortal man in origin, in existence, and in his relation to God. . . Human birth, growth, maturity, and decay are as the grass springing from the soil with beautiful green blades, afterwards to wither and return to its native nothingness.
