National State News

Bonus Bonds.

Commencing June 18 adjusted compensation certificate bonds will be sent, by registered mail, to some 28,000 Oregon World War veterans. It is announced that veterans, after providing proper identification, can cash the certificates after leaving them at postoffices from which checks will be issued.

Wolf Creek Road.

The Wolf Creek short road to the sea is to be given preference over the Wilson river route according to the state highway commission. None of the bids for resurfacing and oiling secondary highways were rejected by the board on the ground that they were too high.

Egg Grading.

The state department of Agriculture is reported as announcing that egg producers would be allowed to use the "A," "B," "C" system of grading by special permission, as soon as necessary details

of the new setup are perfected.

Close Call.

Twenty members of a track-laying crew escaped injury near Bend, Ore., when they jumped from a fast-moving work train which plunged down-grade out of control during a sleet storm. The wheels failed to hold, the train jumped the track and the locomotive plunged over an embankment.

5,338 Miles Per Day.

An average of 5,338 miles, or more than one-fifth of the distance around the world, will be traveled every day by Union Pacific streamliners after the first of June when three trains, that are to follow the "City of Los Angeles" will be completed. This streamliner is scheduled to make the run from Los Angeles to Chicago in 39 hours and 45 minutes. It will make five roundtrips each month between the two cities.

Fire Drills Valuable.

The value of fire drills was demonstrated at Grants Pass when 115 students in the Roosevelt grade school marched out of the building in 15 seconds when the roof caught fire. The blaze was extinguished before any serious damage was caused.

Stork Impartial.

One hundred seventy-seven girl babies and the same number of boy babies were born in Portland during April.

Flour Shipments.

During the first four months of this year the Columbia river district shipped 2,307,107 barrels of flour by water, while the Puget Sound district shipped 2,049,286. A difference in favor of the former of 257,821 barrels.

On June 2, at the chamber of commerce building in Salem, a hearing will be held on promulgating acceptance grades on loganberries for canning and barreling.

A Move Farmward.

According to a government bulletin over 81,000 persons have moved to New York farms, over 11,000 to Maryland farms and over 105,000 to Ohio farms in the past five years. Nearly 200,000 new farmers.

Powdered Shells.

The walnut growers' association of California has installed a machine to pulverize shells. It is said that there are 15 commercial uses for the powdered product.

Delinquent Forest Land.

Up to 1935 Washington state counties owned 1,250,000 acres of forest land obtained through delinquent tax foreclosures. In 18 western Oregon and Washington counties 3,200,000 acres of timber land are tax delinquent.

Large Turkey Hatcheries.

It is reported that in most of the western states large turkey hatcheries with specially constructed incubators have been installed where turkey poults can be hatched at the rate of 15,000 to 25,000 a week. It would appear that this wholesale production of turkeys would eventually bring Thanksgiving and Christmas turkey dinners within the reach of all of us.

Poultrymen's Best Year.

According to the Northwest Poultry Journal (Salem) government reports indicate that this year will be the best year for poultrymen since the depression started. Egg prices and feed cost ratios still remain favorable feed experts announce.

Airplane-Planted Rice.

It is estimated that about 30,000 acres of rice will be planted by air-

plane in Glenn and Colusa counties, California.

Egg prices generally, in April, were from 2 to 4 cents below the prices of the corresponding week a year ago.

Douglas county turkeys, five hens and a tom of Bourbon Red strain, were shipped to the Kaanahou, national park, Hawaii, by Mr. and Mrs. Ward Cockerman of Oakland. They were the leading winners in Bourbon classes at the Northwestern Turkey show last year.

Burt-Allen Race.

U. S. Burt, Corvallis educator, won the democratic nomination for state treasurer by the small margin of six votes. The total vote was, Burt 41,412 and Allen 41,406. The latter graciously accepted his defeat and said "I will abide by the official count. I congratulate the winner and will support him in the November general election." This was the most exciting race of the primaries. It was a see-saw affair from start to finish.

A Great Ball Team.

The greatest Willamette baseball team in the 10-year reign of Coach Roy "Spec" Keene brought its season to a close this week, with a record of 15 victories in 17 games played and the right to wear the title of Oregon's collegiate champions.
