Cottage Grove dropped into second place in the Cascade league when they lost a heart-breaking ten inning affray at Kelly Field Sunday 4-2. The Benton-Lane nine, together with some half dozen substitutions and one base umpire, name unknown, turned the trick.

LaMear, hurling for Cottage Grove was often in hot water, allowing a total of 14 hits, but seemed to work best under pressure, and held the visitors scoreless until the sixth, allowed one run in the seventh, and lost the battle in the tenth. Cooper hit twice out of three for the best stick work of the locals but Libby's timely hit in the eighth, scoring Bricher, tied the score at two all to make the extra frame required. This coupled with his outstanding work behind the plate made him the most valuable player of the day.

The Grove nine lacked their usual hitting power, due to the absence of Towne, Witcher and Riley. Mallory, shortstop for the visitors, was the outstanding player on the visiting team, though C. Sanborn, receiving and Pierson, on the mound, had a good day.

Sunday's game at Kelly Field will see the local nine in action against the Eugene K. C's, who have a revamped and much strengthened lineup, now that college players are available.

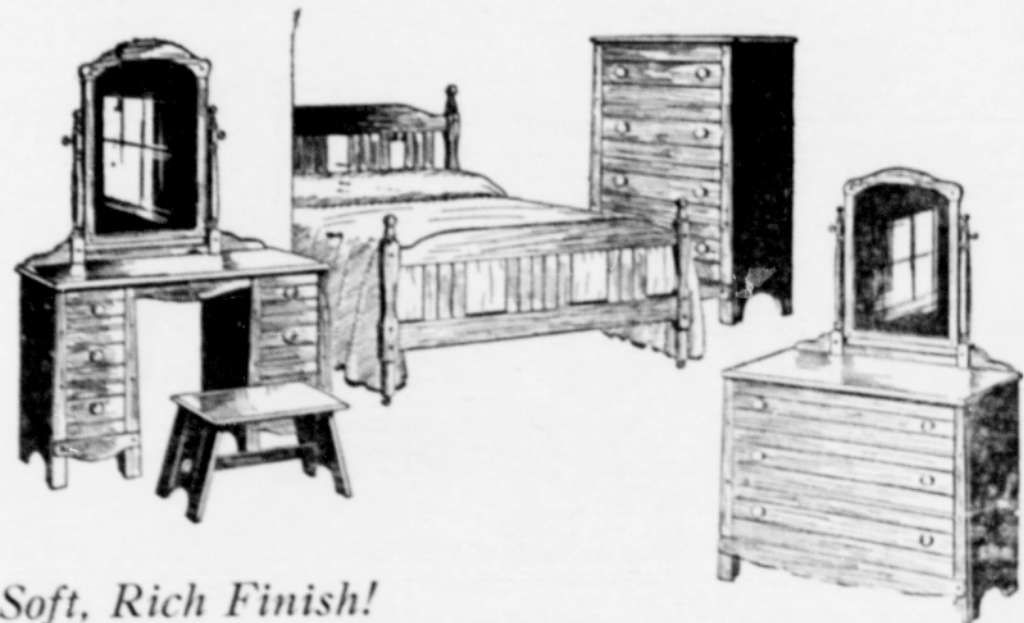


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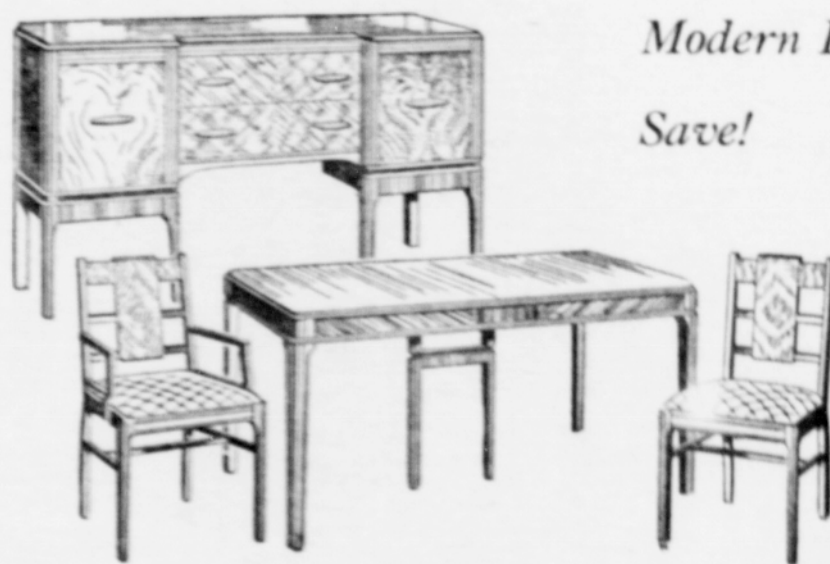
