Five Hundred Entrants in Pet Parade Expected

It is expected that more than 500 entrants will participate in the "pet parade" Saturday afternoon. This annual event sponsored by the chamber of commerce, has stimulated interest among the children of the community and neighboring districts in raising pets of varied description. The committee in charge reported that 700 entry blanks had been given out, 500 going to 4-H club members and the remainder to local children. All entries must be registered with the committee not later than 1:45 Saturday afternoon. The parade will start promptly at 2:30.
