The Pioneer Statute.

The capitol reconstruction committee and the Chemeketa D. A. R. chapter at Salem have recommended that the pioneer statute to top the new statehouse be of Dr. John McLoughlin, chief factor of the Hudson Bay Co., at Vancouver, and a familiar figure of early Oregon history. McLoughlin's home at Oregon City is now a historical shrine and is maintained by the state. He has been called the "Father of Oregon."

\$500,000 for Convicts.

Nearly \$500,000 bonus money will fall into the hands of more than 800 felons in San Quentin prison next week. They will be allowed to spend only a few dollars at a time. One of the eligibles is in condemned row.

World's Biggest Naval Base.

Heavy Fruit Shipments

This fruit shipping season is the best since 1932-33. Portland shipments were 2,205,715 boxes of fruit, including 761,506 boxes of pears. This was an increase of more than 400,000 boxes over 1934-35 and nearly 200,000 over the high mark of 575,776 boxes of pears in 1933-34. Apple shipments totaled 1,444,209 boxes about 90,000 above last, but 900,000 under the 1930-31 high mark.

First ground for Oregon's new \$2,500,000 state capitol was broken June 8 with Governor Martin throwing out the first spadeful of dirt. Other state dignitaries were interested spectators.

Republican Convention.

As The Sentinel goes to press it appears likely that Governor Alf. M. Landon of Kansas will be the Republican Candidate for President and that Senator Steiwer of this state will be his running mate. Ex-President Herbert Hoover and Senator Steiwer have made the most important speeches. It will take 592 votes to nominate and a United Press poll of state caucuses and delegates gave Landon 522 on the first ballot, which may be taken today, Thursday.

Cherry Fruit Flies.

Cherry fruit flies were found emerging in cages in the earliest locations near Corvallis on June 1 and in the later locations near Salem on June 5, according to S. C. Jones, assistant entomologist, Oregon state experiment station at Corvallis. All varieties of cherries as well as interplanted shrubs or brush along fence rows near cherry trees should be sprayed at once. Repeat the sprays after heavy showers or rains. The following materials should be used in the spray: Arsenate of lead, ½ pound; molasses, 2 quarts; water to make, 10 gallons. For further information see Oregon experiment station circular 35 or your county agent.

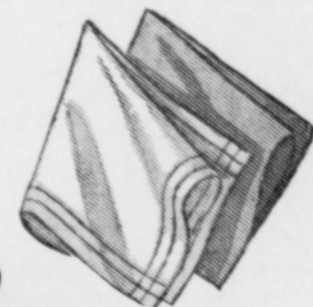
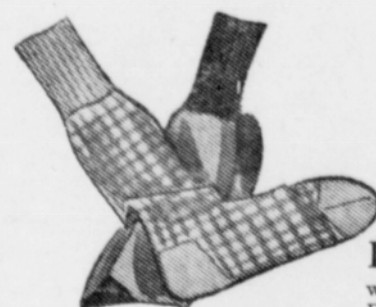
