"Forgotten Men" Date to Ancient British History

During the reign of Charles II, a garrison at Algiers, in North Africa, was forgotten for six years. Faithful to their charge, the soldiers might have spent the rest of their lives waiting but for a party of sailors who discovered them by accident. Of the original 15 officers, only one was alive. The soldiers were in rags and almost starving.

Even more unbelievable, observes a writer in the Washington Post, is the case of the H. M. S. Falmouth, a first-class British warship sent to Batavia in 1776, and forgotten for more than ten years by the British admiralty.

Captain Wallis, commanding the sloop Dolphin, discovered the warship when he called at Batavia and heard the boom of a big gun at sunset. Investigating, he found the Falmouth rotting in the mud offshore. There was not a patch of paint on her, and her sails and rigging were rotting on the masts. The sailors were in rags—gaunt, hungry wretches who clustered around him like scarecrows. All the officers were dead and the last surviving petty officer was a raving maniac.

The crew begged to be taken off, but Captain Wallis couldn't do it without permission from the admiralty. So despite their suffering, the men had to stay on until he returned to England and explained their plight.

White Horse an Emblem

The standards of the ancient Saxons was a white horse, and thus became the emblem of the County of Kent, states a writer in Answers Magazine. A galloping white horse is the device of the House of Hanover. There is a third "white horse"—a rampant animal, the device of the House of Savoy, descended from the Saxon horse. It is from the second of these that the popular Inn sign, the White Horse, is obtained, and usually the animal is depicted as galloping, according to the capacity of the artist.
