Washington Men Congratulate Elbert Bede

(Special Washington Dispatch)

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15—
(CPS)—The entire Oregon delega-
tion on Washington's famed Cap-
itol Hill, as well as many other
nationally known, legislators and
newspapermen, joined here today
in paying sincere congratulatory
tribute to Mr. Elbert Bede upon
his achievement in winning place-
ment upon the mythical "All
American Weekly Newspaper Ele-
ven," picked annually from among
par-excellence weekly newspapers
in the United States and Canada
by Professor John H. Casey, head
of the Department of Journalism
at the University of Oklahoma.

Among the first to congratulate
Editor Bede on his achievement
was Senator from Oregon Fred-
erick Steiwer, Republican keynote
speaker at the recent Republican
National Convention at Cleveland.

"I would like to congratulate
Editor Bede on his achievement,"
said Steiwer. "It makes me very
happy to hear that a son of Oregon
has won recognition on an 'eleven'
that had over ten thousand en-
trants competing for the honor. I
extend my felicitations to Editor
Bede for the honor he has brought
Oregon and himself."

Speaking closely after him was
United States Senator from Oregon
Charles McNary, who has read
Editor Bede's column, "Things We
Think" many times in the past. "I
am very much delighted over the
outstanding recognition accorded
to Editor Elbert Bede, one of the
leading columnists and editorial
writers in the State of Oregon," de-
clared McNary.

"He is to be congratulated on his
fine past achievement and his feat
of today. I am certain he will con-
tinue on with his fine writings for
many years to come."

Speaking as one, the three United
States Representatives from Ore-
gon unanimously declared that
Bede was to be deeply congratulated
on his winning of Professor
Casey's Award.

United States Representative
from the First district of Oregon,
James W. Mott, an old friend of
Mr. Bede, said he "was delighted
to know that my old friend has
taken additional honors to those
he already has."

"I think that Professor Casey
chose the right man to represent
his mythical 'right end' in choos-
ing Editor Bede for the position,"
said Mott. "I congratulate him
now and shall do so further at the
first opportunity, personally."

Though not an Oregonian, Sena-
tor-Publisher Arthur Capper of
Kansas extended felicitations to

Editor Bede as one newspaperman
to another.

"Professor Casey is the 'Walter
Camp of the Nation's Journalism,'
said Capper. "When he in his good
judgement selects a newspaper
and its editor or publisher for posi-
tion on his mythical eleven it is
positive proof that the winning
newspaper journalist has a lot on
the ball. I like especially the All
American citation in honor of Mr.
Bede's column as bright and en-
tertainingly written. It covers a
wide range of interest. The editor
himself donates a great deal of
time to community projects and to
promoting the welfare of the
press of Oregon through his state
press association activities."

Thursday, June 11, at the family

lowing a lingering illness. Funeral
services were held Saturday at
Mills chapel with Rev. C. J. Hall
