Lumbermen Somewhat Relieved

Oregon lumbermen interested in the Oregon and California land grant sales were somewhat relieved by the following telegram from Senator McNary: "While no official action has been taken because of presence of Secretary Ickes at Philadelphia convention, am advised that we may expect a favorable ruling in connection with O. and C. timber sales." Sawmill operators were disturbed over a reported ruling of the interior department holding up O. and C. timber sales.

University Students Working.

The University reports that at some 30 Oregon hotels and resorts this summer the call of "boy" will find a husky athlete of that institution ready to carry the patron's luggage, while in the dining rooms food will be served by coeds working as waitresses. The students have proved to be excellent

"help" for this type of work, and the demand for their services is constantly increasing, it is stated. Many resorts are now manned almost entirely by college and university students during the summer.

Lumber Production.

A total of 200 down and operating mills in Washington and Oregon which reported June 20 to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending June 13 produced 105,618,408 board feet of lumber. The industry produced 64.2 per cent of its average weekly cut during 1926-1929.

The new business reported taken last week by the 200 mills was 100,543,405 board feet. Shipments were 104,872,556 feet. The unfilled order file at these mills stood at 383,027,173 feet.

Production for the week ending June 13 was approximately 6 million feet less than for the preceding week and about 10 million feet less than the weekly average during the month of May. Recent weeks production and orders have been running fairly close together, with production slightly in excess of new business. The industry is now going into the normally quiet summer season, with all markets apparently limiting purchases to immediate requirements.

CCC's Play Ball.

Camp Gunter won a 12-inning battle from Camp Walker to the tune of 7 to 6 Saturday afternoon on the Reedsport field. The pitchers' battle, in which Erceg of Gunter and Costello of Walker each struck out 14 men, stood at a 5 all deadlock at the end of the ninth inning. In the tenth both teams scored a run. Ridpath, Gunter first sacker, hit a triple in the twelfth and scored on the next play to win the contest for the Gunter team. Ridpath led the hitting by getting a homer and a triple which accounted for 3 of the Gunter runs.

This was the third game in the last three starts that went to extra innings. June 6 the Drain Townies played Gunter a 1-1 tie for 10 innings, and Camp Belknap won the 11-inning struggle June 13 5-4.

Franklin Clingenpeel Struck By Car; Injuries Not Serious

Franklin, three year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Clingenpeel, is recovering satisfactorily from bruises sustained when he was struck by a car driven by W. S. Keyes, near the Clingenpeel residence on So. Sixth street Friday. The Clingenpeels who operate the Goff Shoe Shop had moved to Cottage Grove only a week previous, from Eugene.

As a result of the accident, and because children have been making a playground of the heavily traveled Sixth street, Chief of Police Pitcher has warned parents to keep their children off the street.

Rosicrucians Conclave.

All Rosicrucians within a 50-mile area will attend a series of addresses to be given by Cecil A. Poole, K. R. C. member of the National Board of Lectureship of the Rosicrucian Order, AMORC, beginning Tuesday, June 30 in Salem, Ore.

Dr. Simkins, local Rosicrucian, states that these conclaves are traditional with the order. It is declared that during the reign of Amenhotep IV, Pharaoh of Egypt, 1350 B. C., the period in which the philosophical order is traditionally asserted to have had its reign. Rosicrucians began to periodically meet in grotto temples. These secret meetings were for the discussion and contemplation of the then advanced knowledge of the time. Treks to these early conclaves were over the desert waste lands of northern Africa. By contrast, Dr. Simkins states, the Grand Lodge of the Order in San Jose, Cal., equips modern motor vehicles with the latest sound and talking

motion picture equipment, and other devices, to tour the United States to demonstrate to its membership the philosophical and scientific principles of the movement's teachings.

One of the discourses, it is said,

is to consist of a discussion of the legends and archaeological finds appertaining to the continents of Lemuria and Atlantis, referred to by Plato and Sir Francis Bacon. It is expected that all local Rosicrucians will attend the sessions.
