The Social Season Gets Under Way



Women's Necklaces Are Traced Back to 600 B. C.

In the tombs of Egyptian and Grecian women of rank, necklaces made of exquisitely fashioned gold beads, interspersed with colored glass ones, as amber, cornelian, garnet, and crystal have been found, and in 600 B. C. necklaces were shipped from Egypt by the Phoenicians to Greece.

Gold and amber beads of the Bronze Age are found in Southern England and Ireland.

In the Neolithic and later periods the wearing of beads appears to have been universal in all parts of the world, and such trouble was taken to make many of them that they were probably used more as luck charms than as ornaments. In Egypt the word for them was "Shasha," the syllable "Sha" being the Egyptian word for luck.

Since the Middle Ages the manufacture of beads for sale or barter has been carried on in Europe, and explorers have at all times found them invaluable when dealing with natives. Many of the early trade beads are still greatly prized in the countries where they have been sold.

Flexibility of the Hands

It is a generally accepted principle that the fingering of a piano or organ keyboard will vary and be governed by the size and formation of the hand, and the webbing between the fingers, according to a musician in the Montreal Herald. Hands are not all the same in size and pliability, and rules which suited one kind of hand were unsuited to others. The lateral stretch between the thumb and the hand and between the fingers varies very much, and it is not always the largest hands which have the most flexible action. Some large hands are tightly webbed, and some small ones are very flexible and in the playing of arpeggios, the smaller hand will play the greater stretch more easily than the large hand.

James I of England

When Queen Elizabeth, the last of the Tudors, died in 1603, she named James VI of Scotland her successor. James VI had been proclaimed king of Scotland in 1567 when only one year old, but a regency was established. By 1578 he had nominally assumed direction of affairs. When James VI became king of England and the first of the Stuart dynasty he assumed the title of James I of England. During his reign the population of England was somewhat less than 5,000,000.
