Quintuplets' New Brother.

Mrs. Dionne, mother of the famous quintuplets, gave birth to her twelfth child July 9. It was a boy weighing 8 pounds. The attending physician reported that both mother and child were doing well.

Mob Smashes Busses.

Thirty persons were reported injured one day last week when a mob set fire to one bus and overturned three others carrying non-striking from the Norwood, O., plant of Remington-Rand, Inc., to their homes.

Democratic Campaigners.

National Chairman James A. Farley of the democratic party, named Secretary of State Cordell Hull, Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace and Attorney General Homer S. Cummings among the cabinet members expected to campaign for their chief.

Nine Initiated Measures.

Nine initiated measures will be on the ballot at the November election. Three of which are sponsored by the grange: One to establish a state-owned bank to act as a depository for all state funds and some other public monies; one to provide for the election of a commission of three to secure cheap electric power for districts, from Bonneville or elsewhere and to transmit it to consumers; and one providing that the state board of control shall act as such commission until the commission is elected. The other measures are: Forbidding legislative interference with truthful advertising; forbidding the use of seins in the Columbia river; authorizing Portland school districts to exceed the 6 per cent lawful increase in the 1937 school tax levy; the non-compulsory military training bill; and the bill limiting taxes on property to the 1935 figures and compelling a further reduction of 4 per cent each year for the next five years.

Red Menace Not So Dangerous.

The Capitol Press, Salem, of July 10 carried the following:

Portland, Ore.—Reversing the previous position of the American Legion, a personal representative of National Commander Murphy this week told delegates to the National Education Association that the "Red" menace was "not half so dangerous as some of the people who forever talk about it." He stated that the Legion would no longer attempt to instill patriotism by compulsory loyalty oaths imposed upon students or teachers.

State Fair Preparations.

Word comes from Salem that workmen are busy at the state fair grounds preparing for the Diamond jubilee state fair, September 7 to 13. With a \$10,000 legislative appropriation, a new pipeline is being installed to furnish an adequate water supply on hot days of the fair, and landscapers are building a formal garden at the main entrance. Interiors of the agriculture pavilion and horse show stadium are being almost entirely rebuilt with installation of new floors and foundation.

Famine Kills 5,000,000.

Famine has killed 5,000,000 persons in northern Chechen province, according to an estimate July 10 of Chinese relief workers. It has also been estimated that an additional 30,000,000 are facing death and 10,000,000 more are suffering from disease caused by lack of food. In addition to the disasters of nature, raids by Chinese communist soldiers in the past two years have denuded the countryside.

Four Perfect Bridge Hands.

It is reported that F. A. MacCallum, the dealer in a bridge game in Prince Rupert, B. C., found that he had dealt himself 13 clubs. He bid a grand slam and so did the other three players. A showdown revealed four perfect hands. Mathematicians have calculated that this happens once in many thousand hands.

Great First Baseman Retires.

William Harold Terry retired as an active player July 10. He was a truly great player and considered by thousands of baseball fans as the greatest first baseman. He succeeded the late John J. McGraw as manager of the New York Giants. He announced his retirement after conferring with his Tennessee physician who diagnosed Terry's left leg injury as a "torn

Saluting Flag not Compulsory.

Superior Judge Peter J. Shields, Sacramento, Cal., recently held that school children are not required to salute the American flag if the action constitutes a violation of their religious beliefs. The decision was reached in the case of Charlotte Gabrielli, 9-year-old girl, who was suspended from the Fremont grammar school for refusing to take part in flag exercises.

A One-Ton Sunfish Shot.

Last week a huge sunfish weighing a ton was shot while swimming along the Umpqua river near Reedsport, by James Ellis, a fisherman, who captured alive the baby sunfish. The mola mola, the technical name of the sunfish, is generally found in warm climates and warmer water than that flowing in the Umpqua.

Abortion Ring Indictments.

At San Francisco last week 23 persons, men and women, accused of operating a coastwide abortion ring, pleaded not guilty to charges of performing illegal operations. They were bound over to the superior court there for trial October 13. Others of the 31 under indictment, probably with one or two exceptions, will be arraigned later.

Grange Primary Law Valid.

Last week the state supreme court held the grange blanket primary law constitutional, in a unanimous, nine justice decision. The court affirmed the decision of King county, Superior Judge Howard M. Findley in a suit filed by E. Anderson, Seattle, to prevent the county auditor from enforcing the law. The blanket primary law abolishes separate party ballots in primary elections.

Midwest Debt Moratorium.

The resettlement administration has granted a one-year moratorium on rural rehabilitation loans in the drought area. In order to take advantage of the moratorium borrowers must show that they lack cash. A total of 268 counties have been designated as being in the drought area and the agricultural department is expected to name additional counties.

Borah Enters Senate Race.

For the seventh time Senator William E. Borah enters the race for Idaho senator. He filed as a republican and indicated that he would support the republican party and its platform.
