Tax Turnover.

A tax turnover totaling \$15,182.25 was made by the sheriff's office Saturday, according to County Treasurer Grace Schlaka.

Crater Lake Road Bids.

Bids for grading 23.4 miles on the East Rim road in Crater lake national park were opened Thursday by W. H. Lynch, district engineer, U. S. bureau of public roads. Low bidder was Dunn & Baker, Klamath Falls, \$252,187.70.

Oregon Farm Production.

Oregonians in 1934 harvested vegetables from 28,323 acres and sold them for \$1,999,791, department of commerce census figures showed today. Multnomah, Washington and Marion led in acreage of market vegetables in 1934, and Lane, Clackamas, Linn and Douglas counties led in crop value.

World Hop Crop Short.

Oregon will have a small hop crop this year and so will the rest of the world. It is reported that conditions in British Columbia are the same as in Oregon, where downy mildew has virtually destroyed the crop. It is also reported that England will have a short crop, while in Germany the yield will not exceed 50 per cent of normal.

Oregon State Post-Sessions.

The first post-summer session to be scheduled at O. S. C., Corvallis, will open August 3 and continue four weeks. Most of the courses offered will be in education and science, and are arranged to permit graduate students particularly to earn at least 15 credits of advanced work in a summer, which is a requirement many school systems make of teachers to be advanced in rank. It is also intended to serve graduate students taking major work on another campus who want to meet minor requirements in science here.

Coast Defenses.

Major-General White, commander of the northwest national guard division, members of his staff and attached regular and reserve officers are working out detailed plans covering defenses at the mouth of the Columbia river and the Oregon coast line.

District Directors Named.

The Interstate Commerce commission has appointed 15 district directors of its motor carrier bureau, each to be in charge of administration of the motor carrier act in the district to which he has been assigned. Frank E. Landsburg, Portland, is the appointee for district 15 composed of Washington and Oregon.

University Catalog Ready.

It is announced that the university catalog for 1936-37 is now ready for distribution. In it will be found everything the prospective freshman student should know, such as courses, student living expenses, faculty members, scholarships and prizes and many other details. It also contains for the first time a map with all new university buildings. These new structures, totaling nearly \$1,000,000 in cost, will be ready for occupancy during the coming year.

Veterans Are CCC Eligibles.

According to the Lane county Red Cross office, veterans of all American wars, regardless of whether they fulfill relief requirements, are eligible for enlistment in the CCC. To establish eligibility the veteran must be a citizen of the United States, physically able to carry on ordinary manual labor and honorably discharged from the U. S. forces. Applications for enrollment should submit their applications to the veterans' administration, Portland.

Columbia River Map.

A three-color relief map of the Columbia river from its mouth to as far east as the John Day country is presented by the S. P. & S. railway as the feature of a folder just published. Historical landmarks and points of particular beauty and interest are shown on the pictorial map. A description of each of these points is printed on the opposite side of the folder.

Car Insurance Rate Increase.

A 15 per cent increase in automobile accident insurance insurance is likely in Oregon as a result of the increase in the number of auto accidents and injuries, according to a survey made among auto-

mobile insurance underwriters in Portland. Since it has become apparent that the 1936 accident toll will exceed the 1935 record there has been much discussion and agitation for an increase in the rates among insurance actuaries.

Picnickers Take Notice.

Hundreds of improved forest campgrounds have been prepared for the expected heavy influx of campers this month in the national forests, the U. S. forest service announces. Along scores of attractive mountain lakes and streams, ground has been cleared of brush and debris, parking and tent sites have been cleaned, rustic tables and benches set up, outdoor fireplaces constructed and shelters and sanitary facilities prepared. In Oregon more than 600 free forest campgrounds have been improved on 13 national forests.

Britain's Huge Defense Fund.

Great Britain has appropriated nearly \$100,000,000 to be spent on the army and navy and the air force, bringing its 1936 defense budget to \$941,018,500, one of the greatest peace time war preparedness expenditures the world has ever known. The navy construction plan will include seven cruisers, 18 destroyers, and destroyer leaders, two aircraft carriers and eight submarines. It is reported that factors evoking uneasiness in London included: Rapid expansion German armaments, Germany's failure to respond to urgent and repeated British overtures for negotiation on an European peace pact, and uncertainty as to whether Germany and Japan have concluded secret mutual assistance arrangements.
