Mrs. Lyon was an early day school teacher and is remembered lovingly by her pupils, a number of whom still reside in this locality. She taught at the Walker and Shields schools.

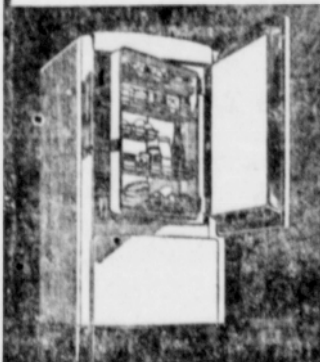
