## Local Nine in First Place in League Race; Defeat Oakridge 11-4

Hills Creek Defeated by K. C.; Next Sunday to See League Leaders Tangle for Top Place.

Stretching their winning streak to four straight Sunday, Cottage Grove went into undisputed first place in the last half race in the Cascade league by defeating Oakridge 11-4 on the local field.

It took the underdog K. C.'s of Eugene to take the measure of the strong Hills Creek team. The Eugene team handed the Hills Creek boys their first defeat of the last half to the tune of 9-4. Schmittz and Schmittz, a new battery for the K. C. nine, accomplished the task at Smimmers' Delight.

But two games remain on the schedule for the last half. Cottage Grove is due to meet Hills Creek next Sunday and Benton-Lane the week following. These are the only teams that have managed to defeat King's men this season, and Sunday's battle, which should decide the last half race, is slated to be the best game of the season.

In the five games played in the last half, King's men have won four straight, dropping the first one to Hills Creek 5-12. Including this loss, they have scored 46 runs to 16 for their opponents. Of the 11 league games played this season, the local team has won eight and lost three, scoring 91 runs to 44 for their opponents.

Cooper and Witcher divided batting honors Sunday, each garnering 3 out of 5, but Cooper stretched one drive into a home run. Cellers, playing only 6 innings, got 2 out of 4. Bricher and Swanson each took 2 out of 5. Shofstall got 1 out of 2, a double, to start the scoring in the second frame, when the locals ran wild to score 6 men on 6 hits.

Johnson, who handled the mound duty for the first six innings for the locals, allowed 4 hits and 4 runs and struck out 11 men. Riley struck out 2, allowed 2 hits, but no runs, in the last three frames. Stanley, on the mound for 6 innings for the visitors allowed 14 hits and 10 runs. Gardner, who replaced him, allowed one hit and one run, Cooper's homer. Libby caught for the locals and Wiseman for the visitors.

## Crater Lake, the Beautiful, Is Attracting Thousands of Visitors

Oregon folks may dream of far places and strange lands which hold a mysterious fascination because of their remoteness. In fancy they may sail the blue Mediterranean sea and pause at the beautiful island of Capri at the entrance to the Bay of Naples, famous for its Blue Grotto and on which there are remains of Roman cisterns and baths. They may actually visit this and other interesting and world-famous spots and experience great pleasure in doing so, but if they haven't visited Crater Lake National park right here in Oregon they have missed seeing a place unsurpassed in beauty anywhere in the world.

The blue of the Mediterranean, the blue of the Blue Grotto is not a whit bluer than the water of Crater lake—water surrounded by walls of volcanic formation said to average 1000 feet in height—water that has a depth of about 2000 feet. No attempt will be made to describe Crater lake. It beggars description!

A 35-mile rim road around the crater edge gives visitors the opportunity of driving around the lake and from each turn of the road gain a new inspiring and thrilling view of the scenic wonder. This is a wide, safe road, but despite that fact it does not mar the primitive landscape as its presence cannot be detected on any point of the rim unless one travels over it.

This last week end the weather was cool, with cloudless days. Roads were in good condition with the exception of a comparatively small portion of the rim road. Nightly programs consisting of a lecture and splendid music furnished by the college and university students who are the bellhops and waitresses at the lodge. Guided naturalists trips, including boat excursions, are offered during the day.

A tree, over three feet in diameter at the top, protruding five above the water, is always an object of interest. It is said that large rocks, caught in its roots, maintain the tree in a perpendicular position, with over 60 feet submerged. The mountain winds cause it to drift slowly.

The visitor is told that that fishing in the lake has shown a decided improvement in the past week, with a number of limits reported. Last week a party of six anglers caught their limits of 12 fish in one afternoon. Spinners, with Royal Coachman flies are said to bring good results, as well as spinners with worms. No license is needed.

It is reported that for the past month travel has been averaging 1500 people on week days and over 3000 on Sundays, representing all sections of the country, with California following Oregon closely for the number of visitors.

One week-end visit is not enough to see and thoroughly appreciate the wondrous beauties of this mountain gem.

The writer is going to Crater lake again. He agrees with Emerson, who said: "Never lose an opportunity of seeing anything that is beautiful, for beauty is God's handwriting—a wayside sacrament—welcome in every fair face, in every fair sky, in every fair flower and thank God for it as a cup of blessing."

## Oregon Health Conditions Are Excellent

According to the report of the Oregon department of health for the week ending July 25, Lane county had only two cases of communicable diseases, both chicken pox. The state report is based on the reports of 80% of the physicians of this county. Aside from these two cases there was one case of erysipelas in the county. There are seven counties with a clean bill of health. They are Crook, Curry, Grant, Harney, Lincoln, Morrow, and Sherman. There are six counties with only one case of communicable disease reported in each. Marion county led with 37 cases, five of which were in the Oregon / Tuberculosis Hospital. Wasco county was second with 32 cases. The report shows a total of only 141 cases of communicable and only 9 cases of non-communicable diseases.

In only 9 counties 100 per cent of the physicians reported. In Clatsop county only 39 per cent of its physicians sent in reports. However, approximately 75% of the physicians in the state sent in reports which show a total of only 150 cases.

This is practically a clean bill of health and only one among many reasons why the population of this state should more than double by 1940.

### Beide in Steamboat Country.

Elbert Bede left Monday for Roseburg where he will join V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Unmpqua forest, and party for a pack trip into the Steamboat country. They will cross from Steamboat to Diamond lake and return by way of Tiller. Mr. Bede has taken a number of forest trips during past years but will travel through a different section of the country this trip. He expects to be gone all week.

## Large Swimming And Life-Saving Daily Class

The swimming and life-saving classes, sponsored by the Lions and the Lane County Red Cross, started Monday at Steel bridge with Wayne Mackin, as instructor.

The 130 members of the largest class that has ever taken part in this annual event, gather every morning and afternoon. The boys and girls are not only learning to swim and save lives but are having the time of their lives. No accidents have occurred and everything is moving along smoothly.

### Morelock Heads Business Bureau

A board of directors to guide the Better Business Bureau, is to be named within the next few days by Cleo Morelock, president and Elbert Bede, secretary-treasurer.

The Bureau, now in the process of organization, was launched Tuesday at the regular Chamber of Commerce meeting. It will sponsor various community activities, launching next week on a twelve weeks program. An effort will be made to list all business and professional men in the city on the Bureau's membership list.

### Special Election Tuesday.

A special city election will be held Tuesday, August 4, to determine whether the city council will be authorized to grant a franchise to the Mountain States Power company for a period of ten years to maintain and operate an electric light and power system within the city. Voters will go to the regular polling places in their respective wards. Complete details regarding the election will be found in a notice posted at the city hall and various polling places.

### Beidler Deserved Credit.

The Sentinel stated last week that H. B. Griggs was chairman of the board of school district No. 45 during the past year. This was an unintentional error. Chas. A. Beidler served as chairman of the board the past term. Mr. Griggs' succeeding him. It was during Mr. Beidler's term of office that the district substantially reduced its indebtedness as outlined in last week's Sentinel.

## Vocational Arts Added to Adult Education Class

Adult classes in education, a WPA project which has been in progress in the city for several months, added classes in handicraft and woodcraft arts to their schedule Wednesday when George Berreman, Lane county supervisor, personally supervised the recreational center at the city park. The outdoor classes are a continuation of the winter program which was instituted by the recreational council of which H. B. Ferrin is chairman.

Classes will be held each Wednesday starting at 2 p. m. Children of Junior high school ages and under will be supervised from 2 to 3. H. L. Robe from Eugene will be in charge of playground activities and will arrange for competitive games and contests for the older children and play ground equipment is furnished for the smaller tots. At the same hour J. W. Lamb of Eugene, a skilled workman of woodcraft, will supervise the children in woodcraft arts. When the Sentinel reporter called at the park yesterday Mr. Lamb had an interested group working with jig saws cutting figures of animals from veneer wood which later will be painted and may be used for various handy ornaments about the home. Other arts will be taken up later.

The hour 3 to 4 p. m. will be devoted to housewives and classes in handicraft will be conducted by Mrs. Colman Warner, who has been supervising similar classes for two years in Eugene. Arts taught will include basketry, rug making, wood work, soap carving, etc. Mrs. Warner will be assisted by Mrs. Rissue, a local resident skilled in such arts. Men interested in such a course may also attend.

Persons of high school and early college ages will meet from 4 to 6 when a constructive course in sports and crafts will be offered with the three supervisors in charge.

Adults, especially business men and women, are urged to join the group in the early evening hours when musical programs and sports, including volley and soft ball, horse shoes and many interesting games will be worked out.

It is the plan, said Mr. Berreman, to conduct some form of classes in connection with the evening program when it will be possible for political leaders and candidates to give short talks explaining their respective party policies and reasons for same. At other centers these meetings are fast becoming popular and crowds beyond expectation have attended. It would be arranged, said Mr. Berreman, that each speaker be allowed fifteen minutes for his talk, then the meeting would be opened for questions. Each person would be allowed one minute to ask the question and the speaker permitted two minutes for the answer.

The classes will continue in the park until late in September and Mr. Berreman with his three assistants will be in charge each Wednesday. Mr. Robe will also be here Mondays and Fridays to supervise the children's play. Parents are urged to send their children and young people to the park where they will be well cared for and receive constructive education as well.

### Local Singers Join Glee Club.

The Misses Kathleen Daugherty, Lillian Gregory, Lorraine Coiner and Beth Hall and Lee Baldwin, James Hemenway and Burdick Trask compose a group which goes to Eugene each Tuesday evening for glee club practice under the direction of Mrs. Edna Pearson. Others in the glee club are young people from Eugene, Springfield and Harrisburg. They plan to appear in concert and on radio programs in the future.

### Painfully Injured.

Fairview, July 28.—A car driven by Mrs. Roy England of Rujada collided with a car driven by Babe Plowman of Dorena near the Kelly bridge on Row river Saturday evening. Edna Steel, an occupant of the Plowman car, was painfully, though not seriously injured. She sustained lacerations of the face and an ankle injury. The drivers of the cars sustained only minor injuries. All were taken to Cottage Grove for treatment but were able to return to their homes. Mrs. England was entering the Row river highway from a side road and failed to see the Plowman car approaching on the main road enroute to Cottage Grove. The England car was badly damaged but damages to the Plowman car were slight.
