Attention Voters

Section 9. of the old franchise under which the Mountain States Power Co. has functioned for the last decade provided: "that in consideration of the right and privilege herein granted, said Cottage Grove Electric Co., its successors or assigns, shall at all times during the life of this grant, furnish said city and inhabitants thereof, light, power or heat, as the same may be required AT A RATE OR RATES NOT TO EXCEED THE RATE OR RATES CHARGED FOR THE SAME OR SIMILAR SERVICE IN OTHER LOCALITIES AND UNDER LIKE CONDITIONS WITHIN THE STATE OF OREGON . . ."

Here is a copy of the schedule of rates published by the Eugene Water Board in the Eugene Register-Guard Sunday, July 26:

SCHEDULE "A" RESIDENTIAL LIGHTING

This schedule applies to private residences, including private garages, barns and other outbuildings that serve the individual residences. And to apartment houses where service is furnished through a separate meter for each apartment. Within the City Limits of Eugene:

First 15 kilowatt hours or less per month (minimum charge)	75c
Next 20 kilowatt hours at	2.5c per kw.hr.
Next 65 kilowatt hours at	2.0c per kw.hr.
All over 100 kilowatt hours at	1.3c per kw.hr.
In order to show you the difference we will give you an example.	
Cottage Grove, under Mountain States:	
65 kilowatt hours at 8c	\$5.20
Eugene under own system:	
65 kilowatt hours at 2c	1.30

A difference of \$3.90

The State of Oregon ranks 2nd in the U. S. for cheap light rates—3c per kilowatt hour; Louisiana ranks 48th with a rate of 8c per kilowatt hour. COTTAGE GROVE'S RATE UNDER THE MOUNTAIN STATES POWER CO. IS 8c PER KILOWATT HOUR. (taken from Rate Series No. 3 & 2 Fed. Power Commission)
