### Lumber Production Declines.

In the northwest lumber production declined more than seasonally in June, because of a reduction in output in the important Douglas fir area, but remained substantially above the level of last year. New orders change little and continued below production.

### Miniature Mt. Hood.

A miniature replica of Mt. Hood will be the dominating feature in the landscaping creations for the Diamond Jubilee Oregon State fair to be held at Salem September 7 to 13.

### Forest Fires.

Lightning held the lead as chief fire cause through July 20, this season on the 20 national forests of Oregon and Washington, according to announcement by the forest service this week. However, the service points out the recently mounting total of man-caused fires and urges caution on the part of forest visitors. Of 236 forest fires reported to date, 142 were caused by lightning, 47 by careless smokers, 18 by carelessly protected camp fires, 13 by brush burning, 4 by incendiaries, 3 by lumbering operations and 9 from miscellaneous causes, the forest service states.

Although early storms in the mountains placed lightning far in the lead as fire cause this season, recent dry weather and increased use of the forests by recreationists are rapidly increasing the percentage of man-caused fires, it is pointed out. Careless smokers and campers caused 20 new fires, against 6 caused by lightning.

### Vacationists Flock to Oregon.

Oregon is now a great recreational area in its own right rather than a state through which travelers must pass in order to reach vacation spots further north, according to E. B. McDaniel, president of the Oregon State Motor association. He says that motor club touring counselors throughout the state are finding a much different attitude on the part of visitors, a change auguring well for state-wide prosperity. "The non-resident is beginning to realize what a wonderful vacationland Oregon really is, and by spending their extra days here the annual tourist business, which already ranks with the largest of industries, will bring additional state wealth."

### King Edward Urges Peace.

A ringing appeal for peace came from King Edward last week just before the attempt was made on his life. Addressing long ranks of uniformed guards at a military review in Hyde Park, scene of the attempted assassination, England's youthful monarch reminded them of the horror and futility of war, which he knows from his own experience in the World war. "With all my heart," he asserted, "I hope and pray that never again will our age and generation be called on to face such stern and terrible days." Then the King told his soldiers: "Humanity cries out for peace and assurance of peace, and you will find in peace opportunities for duty and service as noble as any that bygone battlefields can show."

### One Out of Seven.

Payments by life insurance companies in the last six years benefited one out of every seven persons in the United States, according to the National Association of Life Underwriters. In other words, more than 17,000,000 people received cash from insurance companies between 1929 and 1935 in the form of death claims, annuities and matured endowments. Payments in the form of policy dividends, policy loans and surrender values benefited an even greater number. Thus, during depression, almost 15 per cent of the population lived in whole or part on money paid out by insurance companies in fulfillment of contracts.

### Poultry Feeding Guide.

Poultry feeding for egg quality as well as quantity is strongly advocated in a new extension bulletin, "Feeding for Egg Production," by F. E. Fox, associate professor of poultry husbandry at O. S. C. The bulletin contains established principles and ration for poultry feeding and handling brought up to date with the addition of recent findings.

"Oregon produces a surplus of eggs, which must compete in distant markets on a specified quality basis with eggs from all parts of the nation," Fox points out. "Careless use of feeds that are known to have an objectionable effect on interior quality is damaging to the industry, even if practiced only by a few poultrymen."

Excessive feeding of highly pigmented feeds such as kale, rape, rye pasture, yellow corn and certain weeds like Shepherd's purse, mustard and pennycress will give undesirable color to the egg yolk. Similar complications with the yolk, egg flavor or color of the white may be caused by excessive feeding of cottonseed meal, onions, fish and fish oils. Fox does not ad-

vocate the elimination of these feeds entirely, but urges care in their use in the ration.

### Reduced Crop Prospects.

Drought conditions existing throughout a large part of the United States reduced crop prospects on July 1 to the lowest point recorded on that date for any recent year except 1934. Weather conditions in this district, however, have been favorable in almost all important producing areas, and crops and livestock were in good to excellent condition on July 1. Early estimates of total district production of grain and field crops indicate that output will probably be somewhat larger than in 1935 and will probably exceed the average of recent years. According to the present outlook, fruit and nut crops although smaller than last year, will be about average.

### Crater Lake Water.

The explanation of Crater lake's startling blueness is, according to Dr. Edison Pettit, staff member of the Mount Wilson observatory in California, that the lake water is similar to seven years of settled ocean water with minimum sediment.

### Horticultural Party.

A party of 30 or more horticulturists will be in Eugene August 9. They will visit the plant of the Eugene Fruit Growers association.

### Fake Shoe Salesman.

A warning issued by the Portland Better Business bureau advises Oregon citizens to be on the lookout for an itinerant shoe salesman using the name of J. A. Fields, alias C. E. Bennett. This party is reported to have obtained a sample case and advertising literature of an eastern shoe manufacturer and while he is not an authorized representative of this company he has been soliciting orders and collecting deposits on merchandise that is, of course, never delivered.

Complaints have been made against this bogus salesman from a number of towns in the northwest including several Oregon cities. He is believed to be working in Oregon at this time and is quite likely to solicit orders in any Oregon community.

The Portland bureau suggests that should this individual endeavor to make a sale, the facts be promptly reported to police authorities that immediate investigation may be made.

## Cottage Grove July Weather Is Even and Cool

The report of the daily mean temperature in Cottage Grove for the month of July shows that we have had delightfully cool weather through a month that has been unusually hot in other sections of the United States.

The highest mean, 69½ degrees, was on the twenty-first and the lowest, 58, on the twenty-sixth. Twenty days of the month the mean temperature ranged from 60 to 65 degrees, one of which was 60 degrees and three of which were 65 degrees. Only five days were below 60 degrees and six days were above 65 degrees.
