Churches Against Grocers Selling Intoxicating Liquor

The Christian people of the Cottage Grove churches take stand against grocery stores, drug store or any business place which sell liquor in any form. The action was taken when it became known some of the grocery stores have put beer on sale. The Community Men's Bible class with a membership of 50 passed a resolution against patronizing any business house selling liquor in any form. The First Christian church with 400 members also passed a resolution against patronizing such places of business. Mr. Coulter, minister of the church, said, "Any place of business that sells intoxicant liquor is a saloon, whether it is your home, grocery store, drug store or pool hall and, personally, I refuse to buy my groceries from a saloon. The liquor business is never satisfied; give it an inch and it takes a mile. It forces itself upon the public until our children can not go into the grocery store without having booze staring them in the face."

At a union service of the Methodist, Christian, Presbyterian and Baptist churches of the city a congregation of 200 people voted to refuse to patronize any store selling beer.

The resolution was as follows: Whereas, we are opposed to the liquor traffic, and

Whereas, the liquor traffic is forcing itself upon the public in every possible way, and

Whereas, we see drunkenness increasing and the results of drinking on every hand,

Be it resolved: That we refuse to patronize any grocery store, drug store or any place of business where liquor is sold in any form.

This resolution was adopted by the Community Men's Bible class, First Christian church and by the union meeting held in the city park.
