**Former Schoolmates Recall the Days of "Auld Lang Syne"**

A group of former schoolmates, who attended the old Latham school which was situated just beyond the railroad bridge south of town, before Cottage Grove, then known as Slab Town, boasted a school building, met Tuesday at the home of Mrs. Anna Petrie for a 1 o'clock potluck luncheon. The afternoon was spent in reminiscence of the old days. Mrs. Hattie Best of Portland, a member of the pioneer L. M. According to Mrs. Best the enrollment became so large, 72 pupils, for the one room school and for one teacher to handle, that the district was divided and the first school built in Cottage Grove in the early eighties. The site was on the property where the home of Mrs. Pet Bressler now stands. The play ground extended over the lots where the Armand Wynne home and the Central school are now located. **Lorane-Anlauf Road Survey**

A party of engineers and surveyors will immediately begin a survey for the extension of a secondary road south of Lorane to Anlauf on the Pacific highway in Douglas county.
