## Uniform Signs for Control of Traffic Aim of Oregon Cities

Corner One of a Committee to Study and Suggest System of City Traffic Signs.

Bend, Ore., August 11.—(Special.)—Establishment of the use of uniform traffic control signs within the cities of Oregon is the objective of a committee appointed by C. G. Reiter, city manager of Bend, president of the League of Oregon Cities. Following a study of traffic signs used by various cities of the state the committee will suggest a system of uniform signs for universal adoption within the cities of Oregon. Members of the committee appointed by Mr. Reiter are: J. L. Franzen, city manager of Oregon City, chairman; F. W. Scheffel, city superintendent of Medford, vice chairman; William C. Clubb, city engineer of Eugene, secretary; Ormond R. Bean, commissioner of public works, Portland; E. K. Burton, city engineer, Marshfield; L. W. Colner, city engineer, Cottage Grove; C. M. Hurlburt, city engineer, Hood River; Angus McAllister, city manager, La Grange; Charles W. Clark, mayor, Roseburg; S. A. Hofer, mayor, Woodburn; Captain Fred M. West, head of traffic division, Portland bureau of police; John S. Beakey, Traffic Engineer, state highway commission. The State Automobile association has also been asked to cooperate in this study.

"People who travel from one city to another often complain that they are confused by the variation among cities in the types and placing of traffic signals and street signs," states President Reiter in announcing the purpose of the committee. "Traffic hazards are increased when a traveler in a strange city fails to see a sign because it is located in a different place than he is accustomed to. The executive committee of the League has authorized the appointment of this committee in hopes that it would be able to develop uniformity which would result in safer driving in our cities." Presi-

dent Reiter added that in some instances cities have installed their own system of traffic signs, some of which have had to be removed when the state highway was routed through the city streets, since the State Highway Commission has adopted a uniform plan.

"Traffic control devices are increasingly necessary for regulating, warning, and guiding travelers," Mr. Reiter continues. "Traffic control requirements cannot be determined by guess work. They should be based on sound engineering principles, established by factual studies of accidents, speeds, delays, and physical conditions which will show the exact nature of the difficulty and indicate what particular device or method of control is needed. Adequate but not excessive use of signs to warn of hazards, signs to indicate the applicability of traffic regulations, route markers and destination signs all have great value in facilitating the orderly flow of traffic. Application of sound principles and the selection, installation and operation of traffic signals is of the highest importance. Misapplication of these traffic control devices, however, besides wasting public funds, causes delay and confusion and promotes disrespect for and disregard of all control devices."
