Trekking Northwestward.

Milk Quality Handbook.

A condensed handbook containing instructions for producing high quality milk and cream on the farm is the form in which a new extension bulletin, No. 489, has been issued at O. S. C. It lists the 10 chief factors involved in quality production.

Suit to Test Validity of TVA.

A new suit to test the validity of the Tennessee Valley Authority has been started in the federal court at Birmingham, Ala. The suit is being brought by 19 private utilities operating in the TVA region.

Careless Smokers Cause Fires.

Of 62 men caused forest fires reported on the 20 national forests of Oregon and Washington for the 10 days ending August 1, careless smokers caused 34, careless campers 15, railroads 7, lumbering operations 3 and brush burners 3, according to the U. S. forest service.

Oregon Beef Production.

Oregon is one of 20 states which produces a surplus of beef, with approximately 40 per cent of the production here being sold outside the state. There is no shortage of beef in prospect.

Crater Lake Park, Aug. 11.—(Special.)—A link between the volcanic past and the quiescent present of Crater lake is numerous fumaroles submerged near Wizard island, geologic evidence of tremendous pressure many centuries ago when the island was an active volcanic cone following the destruction of old Mt. Mazama.

Business Men's Alliance Makes Power Proposal

The Business Men's Alliance submits the following proposal: The Honorable Mayor and common council of the city of Cottage Grove, the Mountain States Power company, Cottage Grove office: Gentlemen:

WHEREAS, the voters of the City of Cottage Grove, Lane county, Oregon, on the 4th day of August, 1936, voted against (148 For—435 No) authorizing the common council to pass an ordinance granting a franchise to the Mountain States Power company, a Delaware corporation, its successors and assigns, the right, privilege and franchise to erect, maintain and operate in the City of Cottage Grove, Lane county, Oregon, an electric light and power system, and to use the streets and alleys of said City for said purpose, and said franchise to be granted for the term of ten years, and for the payment to the city as consideration therefor a gross earning tax of two percent, excluding sales to the City...

WHEREAS, we wish to bring about a fair and equitable settlement of this question. WHEREAS, the Business Men's Alliance represents and is backed by a majority of the voters of the city of Cottage Grove we do propose the following system be set up to bring about complete and justifiable rectification of the situation aforementioned.

Section I. A commission, board or committee of arbitration be appointed in the manner hereinafter provided.

1. This commission, board or committee shall consist of: One arbitrator to be appointed by the Mountain States Power company, who shall be a member of the Cottage Grove office staff of this company. One arbitrator to be appointed by the common council, who shall be a member of that body. One arbitrator to be appointed by the Business Men's Alliance of Cottage Grove, who shall be a member of that group.

Section II. The above appointed commission, board or committee's duties shall be: 1. To investigate the schedules of light and power rates.

Section III. The expenses of this commission, board or committee shall be provided for in the following manner: (a) WHEREAS, the Common Council is the representative of the people it shall pay for one half (1/2) of the expenses shown in the audited report filed by the commission, board or committee. (b) WHEREAS, the Mountain States Power Company shall receive the benefits of this investigation they, the Mountain States Power Company, shall pay one half (1/2) of the expenses shown in the report filed by the commission, board or committee.

2. Should any of the parties heretofore mentioned in Section I refuse to accept this plan within 30 days after its presentation or after

accepting the plan they should refuse to cooperate with the terms of this plan in the opinion of the Public Utilities Commissioner or his appointee the plan and all of its provisions shall be considered null and void as soon as such action is taken or opinion expressed.

3. Any expenses incurred prior to the time of refusal to cooperate of any of the parties accepting this plan shall be audited and provided for as heretofore provided in this section (sec. III).

It is hoped that the parties to whom this plan is submitted will see fit to adopt it as it will bring the desired results of satisfying the citizens of the City of Cottage Grove and all parties concerned.
