

Oregon's Safest Driver Selected



Robert S. Kreason (in car), Dallas attorney, has been selected from a list of more than 600 applicants to represent the state at a traffic convocation in New York this month. His driving record of 210,000 miles in the past 30 years, without accident, earned him the designation as Oregon's safest driver.

Mr. Kreason stated: This is the greatest surprise I ever had. For years I have been planning to drive back to New York and see my family in Hornell, but circumstances have prevented it. I have not seen my parents since 1919, just after the war, and they have never seen my wife and two daughters. The "safest driver" attributes his good driving record to his willingness to "take my time" when making a trip. He says he has always made sure his machine was in good condition before taking it out. "And," he added, "I have always kept my eyes open for what the other fellow would do."
